A few years ago technicians from the American Iron and Steel Institute made lengthly experiments with of the Empire State Building. All they could report was that the building "might" have swayed approximately one-eighth of an inch.

The tower is so high that temperatures usually are from three to nine degrees lower than at street lever; the record to date is 16 degrees below zero on a day when it was eight above on Fifth Avenue. Wind velosities of 60 to 80 miles an hour are common, and 100-mile blows have been recorded. One lusty gust, exceeding the 125 mile per hour mark, wrecked the

ecording instrument. The outer balcony is closed to the public when the wind exceeds or 35 in the winter. But the popular notion that the whole structure sways in the wind is false. Engineers estimate that it would take nine hours of a steady 90-miles blow to move the tower one and one

The Bovina Mustangs stopped the Farwell Steers, 68-66, for the third time in four attempts and the second time in two district encounters.

The Ponies trailed for three quarters, two and one-half minutes. But with 5:24 remaining on the scoreboard clock, Erith Hawkins tipped in a two-pointer and the locals had the lead for the first time during the game. At one time they were 14 points be-

The first half belonged to the Steers. They jumped to a short lead early in the game and were in possession of it at the end of the first quarter, 20-16. They stretched that lead to seven points and a 36-29 count at the half. Crafty Neil Smith kept the

local five in the running in the first quarter by slipping inside the Farwell defense for spectacular crip shots. The Mustangs gained two points

Students in the first through the seventh grades presented a talent show in assembly last Friday morn-







4. Row spacing in each must not be more than 42 inches. The 70 yards of row harvested in each contest must have rows with good

5. Awards will be made on the basis of pounds of production per Massey-Harris 44 tractor and plant- acre and records. Pounds of production per acre will count 60 per cent and records will count 40 per cent. Records in both contests must be completed and turned in to the county agent or 4-H leader by January 6, 1957.

6. All varieties of grain sorghum qualify except hybrids, which will be ruled out in 1956 because all entrants will not be able to obtain planting seed.

26-tfnc 7. Grain sorghum yields will be computed by heading and weighing from 70 yards of measured row. Stem length on heads cannot be more than one inch, two moisture tests must be run on grain from heads weighed in the contest, and certified to by persons running moisture test. All grain will be converted to 14 per cent moisture. Moisture tests must accompany records.

8. All varieties of cotton, grades, and staples qualify.

9. Cotton will be computed by pulling and weighing burr cotton from 70 yards of measured row 27-tfnc after December 1 on a dry afternoon. No bolls will be pulled unless they are open enough to be hand picked without the use of force to open the burr.
