John Thomas Grimsley Fred Tidwell Dies

John Thomas Grimsley, who passed away in an El Paso hospital on Sunday, April 11, was the son of J. B. Grimsley, and was born at Mansfield, Texas, in Oct. 1881. He came with his father's family to Donley County, and lived around Hedley and Clarendon, moving to El Paso in 1935.

He was married to Miss Esther Lowrey in 1910; she and six children survive him; also nine grandchildren. The sons are Major J. L. Grimsley of Hopewell, Va., C. W. Grimsley of Ft. Bliss, El Paso, and John B. Grimsley of Livermore, Calif.; the daughters are Mrs. J. W. Hargrove of Lubbock, Mrs. J. P. Royal of Grand Prairie, and Mrs. J. W. Honea of Arlington. Three others preceded him in death. He also left two brothers, C. A. Grimsley of El Paso, and W. E. Grimsley of Hedley, and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Woolver of Marlowe, Okla., Mrs. O. C. Lowrey of Dalhart, and Mrs. G. D. Hemphill of Canutillo.

John Grimsley became a Christian in early life, and was a member of the Christian Church in El Paso. Services were conducted in the Chapel of Kaster & Maxon, funeral directors, on April 14, by his pastor, Rev. Capps. He was laid to rest at El Paso.

W. E. Grimsley and family attended the funeral services for his brother, John T. Grimsley, in El Paso this past week. He wishes to thank those who so willingly took care of his things at home, to make it possible for them to go. We are very grateful and hope can do something for each of you sometime.
