Clarendon Celebration William T. Owens Set For July 2, 3 and 4

Everything is in readiness to entertain thousands of visitors in Clarendon July 2nd, 3rd and 4th. This annual celebration is the oldest Fourth of July Celebration in the Panhandle Ranchers and Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. ey. Clarendon businessmen have made it a policy to keep this celebration in line with the pioneer spirit by morial Park Cemetery. offering a free barbecue with no strings attached on July 3rd. H. M. "Flip" Breedlove, County Agent for Donley County, is the barbecue king and has the reputation for putting out barbecue with | brothers, Tom, Gus, Henry, Sam, all the trimmings equal to that served anywhere. Twelve lines will be set up on the court house square to handle the serving, which will begin at 11:30 AM July 3rd and 108 people will be on hand to handle the serving. Approximately 6,000 visitors were served in an hours time last year.

Rodeo performances will be held on Friday night July 2nd, Saturday afternoon and night of July 3rd and Sunday afternoon July 4th. Afternoon performances will start at 2 PM and the night performances will begin at 8 PM. A \$3,500.00 purse will attract amateur contestants from near and far. All contestant entrees must be in by 3 PM July 2nd.

A big Western Parade will follow the serving of the barbecue dinner on July 3rd at 1 o'clock. Featured in the parade will be the twenty-five Rodeo Queen Contestants sponsored by Clarendon merchants, along with numerous horseback riders, floats, etc.

The Clarendon American Legion Post will be in charge of the dances which will be held three nights, July 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Emmett Allen and his Sunset Ramblers will furnish the music.




