## American Legion Days

October 20 through November 11 has been designated by President Eisenhower, Governor Allan Shivers and many Texas mayors as "American Legion Days" and the local Adamson-Lane Post of the American Legion is planning to dedicate that period to acquainting Texas citizens with the program of the organization according to Post Commander Ansil Adamson.

According to Commander Adamson October 20 is the beginning of the new fiscal year of the American Legion and since World War I, November 11 has been known as "Armistice Day." "American Legion Days" will be concluded locally with a full scale observance of November 11 which has now become known as "Veterans Day."

Commander Adamson explained that Armistice Day, VJ Day, VE and other dates were all of great importance but it was decided to name one day in the year when all veterans will be honored.

The Texas Legislature and the United States Congress have designated November 11 as "Veterans Day" and the American Legion plans to make its first observance a banner one in Hedley. Fitting church observance and memorial services are planned for November 11.

During the "American Legion Days" observance Legionnaires will make a special effort to inform veterans of World Wars I and II and the Korean conflict with the aims and purposes of the American Legion, Commander Adamson stated.

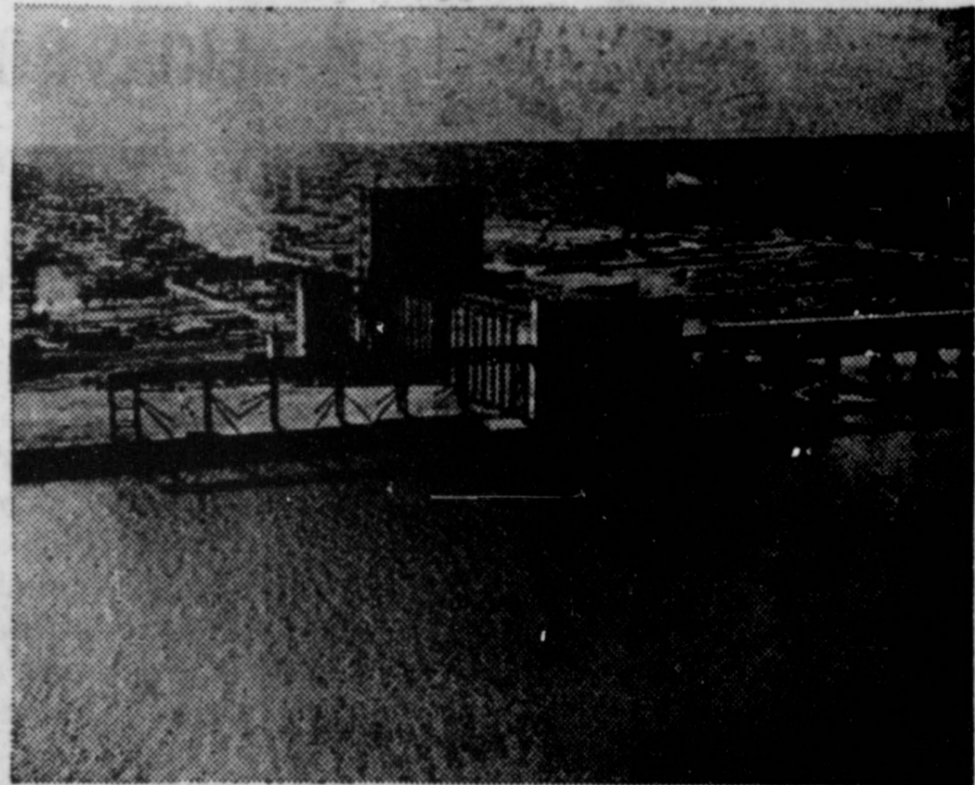

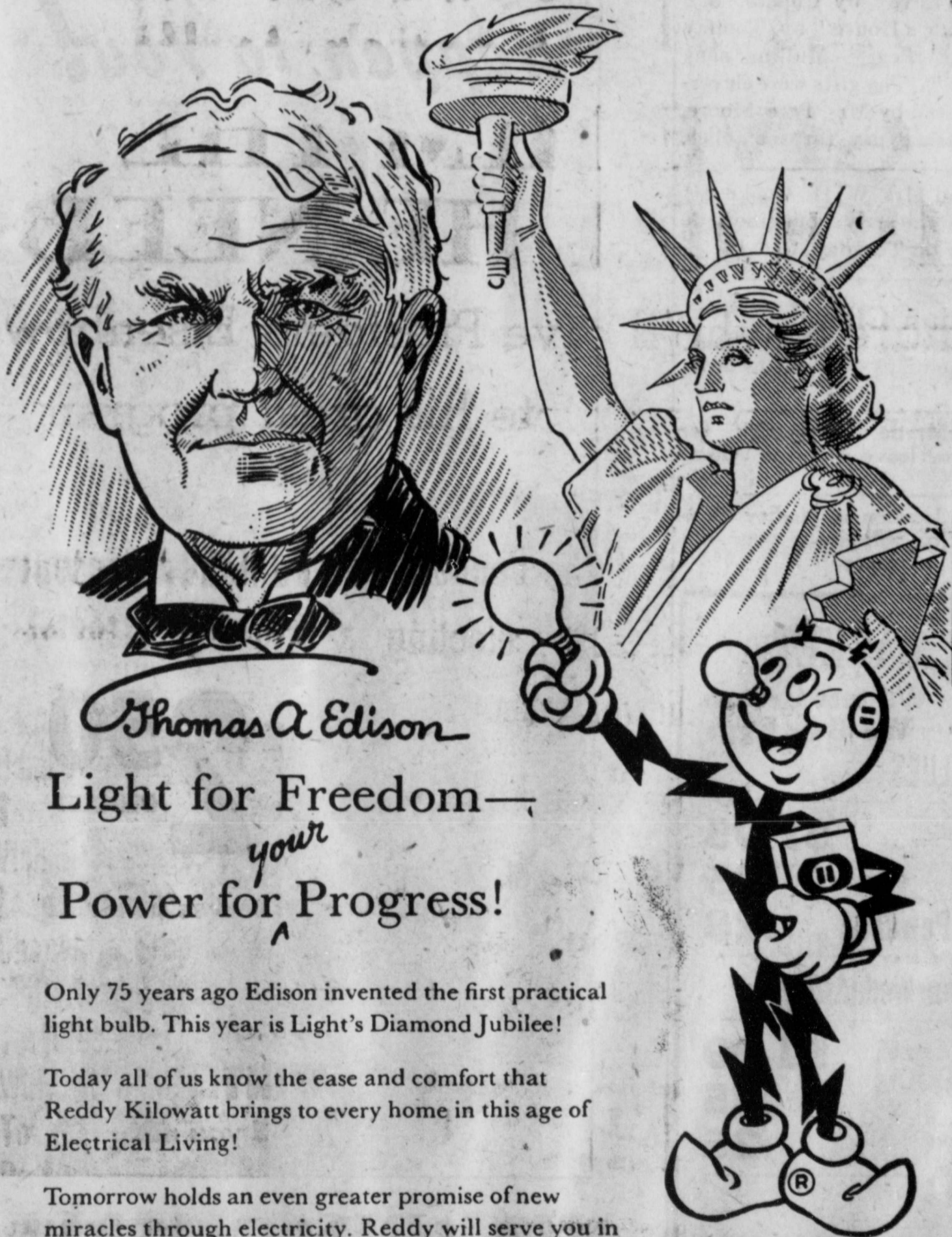
