THE THREATENED strike by the nation's truck industry holds a lot more than just passing interest for the residents of our area.

Of course we all are aware of the tremendous impact that the trucking industry has on our lives, since the entire nation moves by truck.

One of the biggest objections of the truckers is the proposal to increase the federal use tax from approximately \$221 per year to a maximum of \$2700 per year—more than a whopping ten times its present level.

And, according to one of our contacts, this use tax is to be extended to many farm trucks, particularly tandem trucks. If this federal use tax is increased as per the proposal, custom combine operators would really be hit a lick. They would have to increase their prices accordingly to their customers, the farmers.

At a time when the agriculture industry is having to "tie a knot and hang on," the proposed compounding of the federal use tax might serve as the death knell to many farmers.

Another area where the federal government threatens to hurt the truckers, farmers and consumers is in the tire industry, as the feds are proposing a tax on rubber goods equal to 50 cents per pound at the time of purchase.

If you are a fairly big tire user, you can do a little mental arithmetic and see right quick that this new tax could also cause you a little pain in the hip pocket.

The truckers, and perhaps even the farmers, are not as vocally opposed to the proposed five cents per gallon federal tax, which is supposed to create thousands of new jobs and entail keeping up our country's highways and bridges. (State officials have their doubts as to how effective this program will be, however, and just how much it would benefit our state).

But this outrageous federal use tax, and the companion proposal for the rubber industry, will directly affect everyone who reads this piece. Therefore, if you feel so moved, it might be in order to contact your congressman, and add these new woes to your list.

Congressman Kent Hance, by the way, will be the featured speaker at Friona's Chamber of Commerce banquet the evening of January 20.

If you would like a chance to talk to the congressman in person, then you should get a ticket to the banquet and plan to attend.

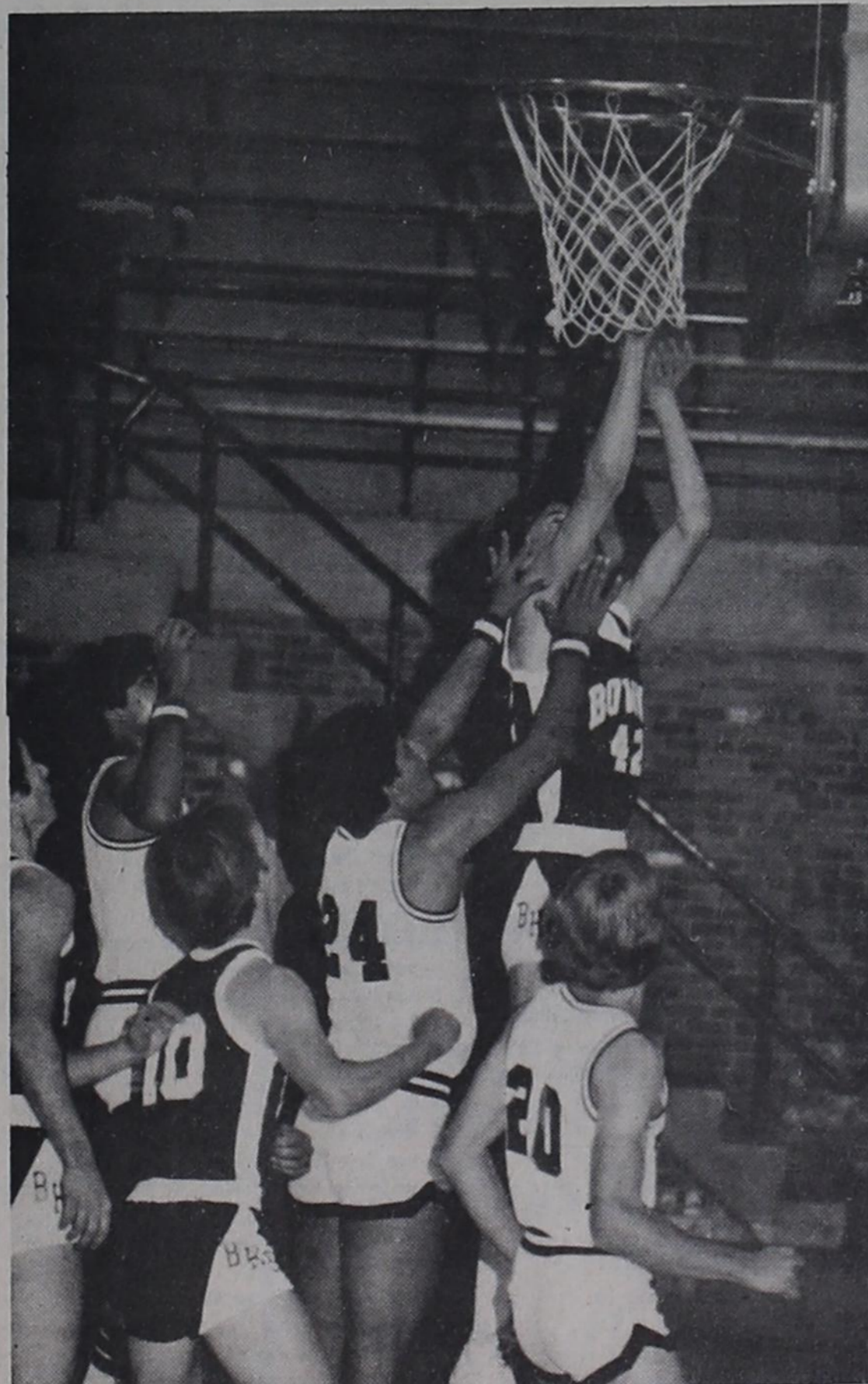
There will be time for comments

Scotts Enjoy Trip To Holy Land

Eugene and Edna Scott have recently returned home from a ten-day trip to the Holy Lands. They were accompanied by Edna's sister and sister-in-law, Bobbie Rossomano of Riverside, California, and Josie Campbell of Clovis.

Twenty-one people made the tour. The group leader was Dr. Vance Holland of Eastern New Mexico University, Portales.

The group flew to Amman, Jordan, and then took bus trips to Jerico, the Dead Sea, then on to Jerusalem and toured the surrounding area including the old walled city of Jerusalem, Mount of Olives and the House of Caiaphus. This house is where Jesus traditionally spent his last night on earth.

The group went to Bethlehem, and saw the place of Jesus' birth, and also to Hebron, where they saw the tombs of Abraham and Sarah. They visited the Sea of Galilee, and went across to Capernaum. This is where they spent New Year's Eve.

The tourists traveled to Haifa, which is on the Mediterranean coast, and down the coast to Tel Aviv, and back to Amman.

The group then flew to Cairo, Egypt, and saw the Great Pyramids, the Sphinx and the National Museum in Cairo. They were able to see King Tut artifacts while at the Pyramids. They also were allowed to go up to the burial chamber. Members of the tour rode a camel while there.

After their Egyptian trip, the group returned to Amman, and then flew back to New York. Scott said the flying time, Israel to New York, was 22 hours. He said the weather was very comfortable, with the temperatures in the mid-60s.

The Scotts said that around Jerico and the Sea of Galilee, every kind of flower and citrus fruits can be seen. Olive trees grew on the rocky hillsides, and drip irrigation supplied the plants' needs, except for the olive trees.

The Sea of Galilee Water Reservoir supplies all of Israel, both agricultural and industrial. The sea could actually be considered a lake, which is about 12 miles wide, 40 miles long and 160 feet deep.

Jerusalem is built on a mountain range, and the city of Jerusalem is about 4,000 feet above sea level. They said Jerusalem was very pretty, with many kinds of flowers blooming at this time.

Jerusalem is only 50 miles from the Dead Sea, with some 5,300 feet difference in elevation. The Sea of Galilee also is 700 feet below sea level.

The people of Jerusalem are said to be very receptive, since tourism is their main industry.

Scott said that the city of Cairo had

poverty to the extent that it was hard to imagine. "Many of the shelters where people live are not worthy of animals, much less human beings. However, there also is a wealthy side of the city, and the hotel in which we stayed was fabulous—as fancy as those we have in our country," he said.

The group said they thoroughly enjoyed their trip, and felt it was worth their time and money. They left home December 26 and returned January 4.

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Mustangs Win Two; Take Consolation

The Bovina Mustangs, who came back from the Christmas break with an 11-1 season record, only managed a split in their four games during the past week, and saw their record come out to 13-3 at the end of the week.

The team began its week by visiting Texico, N.M. on Tuesday. Texico had been the only team to defeat the Ponies up to that point, and Bovina was wanting revenge for the defeat.

But the Wolverines prevailed once again, 59-56. Texico got off to an early lead, 18-10, and although the Mustangs rallied to make the game close, they just couldn't pull it out.

Richard Shepherd pumped in 20 points, 18 from the field, and Greg McClaran matched that total, all on field goals.

Bovina didn't get many free throw opportunities, and that turned out to be the difference in the game.

Bovina met the Muleshoe Mules in the opening game of the Lazbuddie Tournament Thursday, and had "one

of those games"—where very little goes right. Muleshoe won the game, 55-52.

The Mules took control in the third quarter, when they outscored the Mustangs, 20-7, and Bovina could not recover this difference. Shepherd's 18 points again paced the Ponies.

In second day action, the Mustangs came back to whack Cotton Center, 62-34. Bovina had a 37-9 lead at halftime, when it was bench-cleaning time. McClaran scored 13 points and Joe Pat Wright added ten.

The Mustangs copped the consolation championship of the meet with another lop-sided win, downing Hart on Saturday, 78-28. Shepherd tossed in 22 points and Jon Riddle added 15.
