Questions and Answers On Salt Fork Dam

In the near future a confirmation election will be held in the seven area towns concerned to approve or reject the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, which proposes the dam across Salt Fork of Red River north of Hedley. The Informer is publishing a series of articles in question and answer form to acquaint the voters with the facts concerning this project.

Question: How was the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority created?

Answer: The committees from the interested cities employed McCall, Parkhurst & Crowe, Bond Attorneys of Dallas, Texas, to direct the entire legal procedure required for the origination and final completion of this project; whereupon the attorneys prepared a Legislative Act creating a conservation district under Article XVI, Section 50 of the State Constitution. Through the cooperation of the Representatives and Senators within the area, this bill was passed by both the House and the Senate and became a law when the Governor signed the same. The bill is identified as H. B. No. 88 of the 53rd Legislature of the State of Texas First Called Session.

Q: For what purpose was this Authority created?

A: This Authority was organized for the purpose of conserving the water properly belonging to the Greenbelt area now flowing completely away, storing such water and thereby providing a permanent, dependable and adequate supply of good water to the citizens of the cities and towns who vote to accept membership in the Authority.

Q: What was the origin of this program?

A: For many years a group of local citizens had the idea that the Salt Fork of Red River and Whitefish Creek had a substantial water shed capable of producing a large amount of water if a dam was constructed to impound such water; those individuals obtained early water rights and succeeded in getting them extended from time to time, anticipating that the water would surely be needed in the future for domestic or irrigation purposes.

in the formation of the project?

A: Citizens from the cities of Wellington, Hedley, Clarendon, Memphis, Childress, Paducah and Quanah associated themselves for the purpose of exploring the actual amount of water which might be available from the Salt Fork and Whitefish Creek drainage area. They contributed funds for expense and employed Mr. A. H. Woolverton, a hydrologist of Austin, Texas, to make a preliminary report upon the amount of water which could be impounded and a possible location for a dam site as well as to assist them in obtaining water rights from the State Board of Water Engineers.

John T. Forbis Announces For District Attorney

John T. Forbis of Childress has authorized the Hedley Informer to announce his candidacy for the office of District Attorney, 100th Judicial District. In making his announcement Mr. Forbis made the following statement.

Through a period of many years the people of this state have developed and placed upon themselves a system of rules and regulations to guide their conduct. History has proven that this system of penal statutes is based upon reason, and that the common good is best served when violators of these statutes are punished for their crimes.

The people of Texas are represented in the prosecution of the more serious offenders by a District Attorney, whose duties must be performed with skill, diligence and complete integrity. He must be able to wholly disregard the political significance of his acts, and must be guided by an enlightened conscience. His prosecutions must be thoroughly and well presented but must never become persecutions.

I was born in Childress and lived there until I was five years old, when my parents moved to Wellington. My education came from the Wellington public schools, from Southern Methodist University, and from the Southern Methodist University School of Law, which granted to me the Bachelor of Laws Degree in January of 1950. The greater portion of my college and law school work was made possible by the benefits under the G I Bill of Rights, following my service in the US Navy during World War II.

For six years I have practiced law in Childress in the law firm of Williams, Broughton & Forbis, and live in Childress with my wife, Jeanne, and my fifteen month old daughter, Nancy. For five and one-half years I have served Childress as City Attorney.

To City Taxpayers

All unpaid City taxes became delinquent on Feb. 1st. The City of Hedley follows the law governing delinquent county taxes, as set forth in Article 7336, Vernon's Texas Statutes, and which adds a penalty each month until it reaches 8% within six months, and which also adds interest at the rate of 1/2% per month, or 6% per year.

Thus a taxpayer who is delinquent one year owes the full amount plus 14%, one who is delinquent two years owes the full amount plus 20%, etc.

To encourage getting rid of these delinquents, the City of Hedley has decided to allow payment of these taxes without penalty and interest until March 1st.

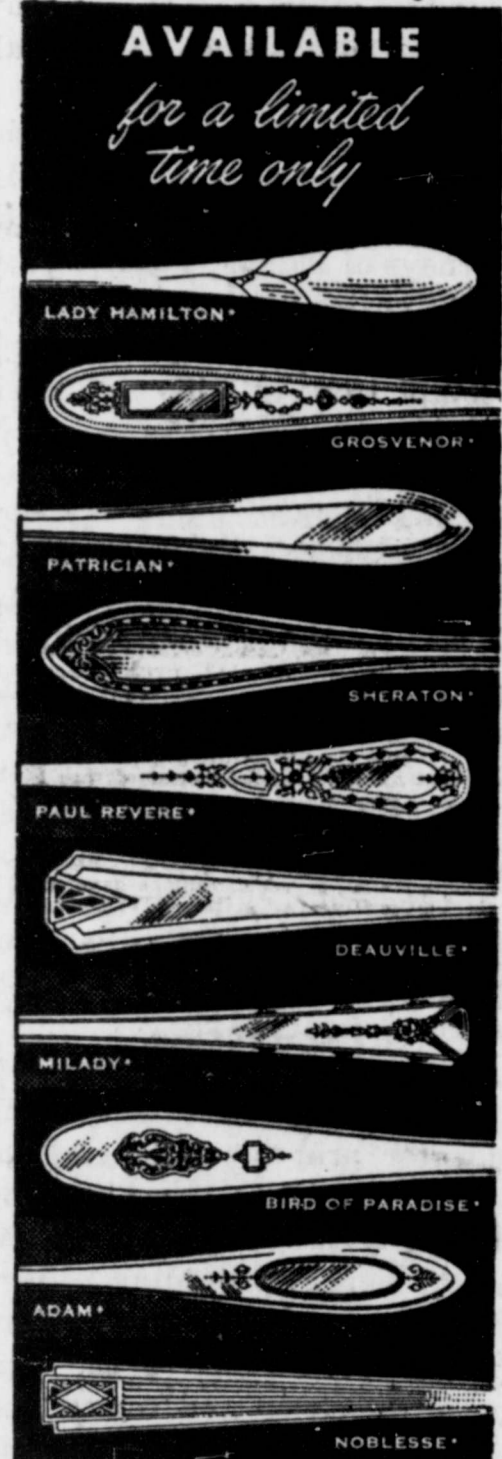
