

## Mustangs Stumble To Groom

The Bovina High School Mustangs, still struggling due to early-season injuries, suffered a 26-8 defeat to Higgins in a game at Groom Saturday afternoon.

Bovina held an 8-6 lead in the second quarter, and trailed at halftime only 12-8.

But the Mustangs never could get a drive going in the second half at all, while Higgins had two more scoring drives.

"Higgins contained us pretty well in the second half. They seemed to know what we were going to do. I was well pleased with our play in the first half, but we need to put two halves together," said Bovina Coach Terry Bean.

Higgins scored first, for a 6-0 lead, when Bovina got the ball in the second quarter. The Mustangs drove the ball up the middle four or five plays, then went to an unbalanced line and went the opposite direction. The play worked for a 30-yard run by Denver Riddle, advancing the ball within the opponents' ten-yard line.

Two plays later, Riddle took the ball over from the three yard line. Bud Venable kicked the PAT, giving Bovina its lead of 8-6.

Higgins held the ball most of the second half. All of their scores came on passes from Dwayne Willyard or Freddie Valenzuela. Higgins outgained the Mustangs, 360-139.

Bovina welcomed two of its starters back, seniors Scott Scaff and Billy Scott Sudderth.

Scaff had not played in a regular-season game. "It was good to have him back. His size, speed and strength will help us. Sudderth also is a good leader. It's great to have a senior who can come in and take charge," Bean said.

Riddle was Bovina's leader on offense, but Bean indicated the team's inability to stop Higgins eliminated nominating a defensive standout.

## Cancer Unit October 13

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

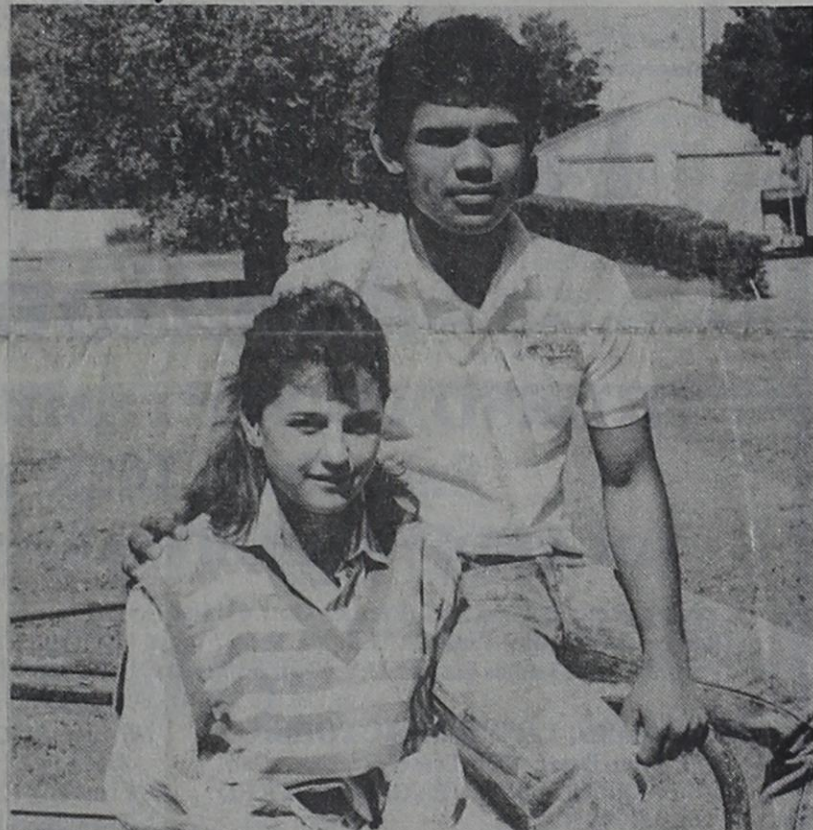
In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on October 13 from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The mobile unit will be parked at Bovina City Hall at 205 North Street. Appointments may be made by calling 806-238-1116.

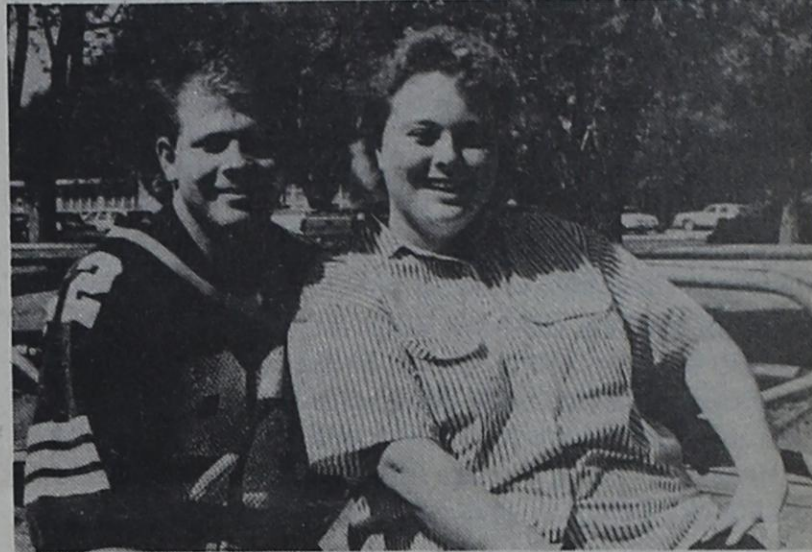
"I usually dread homecoming games, but since it's our first home game, even that won't be so bad this time," said Bovina coach Terry Bean.

## Craig To Head Parmer Co. Bee

For the 41st year, West Texas State University in Canyon and the Amarillo Globe-News will again sponsor the National Spelling Bee for young students in the area.

Named as director for Parmer County is James Craig, principal of Farwell School.

The director will coordinate the Bee program with the private and public schools and select a date for the county competition.

The Amarillo Globe-News requests that each county finalist be named by March 18, 1989.

The Scripps-Howard National Spelling Bee rules allow any student who will not be in a grade higher than the eighth or older than 16 by the end of the current school term to enter the contest.

Additional information is available from the county bee director.

There are two levels of competition. A Junior Bee is for students in the fifth and lower grades. In previous years, the Junior Bee included the sixth grade students, but with the middle school concept, the sixth graders are now to be included in the Senior level, which also includes grades seven and eight.

The Junior Bee primarily serves as an introduction to the program.

Junior county winners do not compete in regional unless they win the Senior county title. In some cases, directors combine the two levels of competition and choose only one county champion.

Each senior winner will compete in the AGN-WTSU area contest on the university's campus on April 15. The top winner in that event will be given an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. for the speller to represent the district in the 1989 national contest. The trip is for two, courtesy of the Amarillo newspaper.

The Junior winner and Senior winner from each county will be guests of the sponsors at a Bee luncheon in Canyon preceding the afternoon competition. There will be special awards for all finalists.

Copies of the study book, "Words of the Champions," are available from Jeane Bartlett, bee editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, at fifty cents each. This word list is used in most school eliminations and contains more than 3,000 words.

Parts of the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas are included in the AGN-WTSU district. Forty-six counties will be represented in the 1989 regional bee in April.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

### The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit Will Be In Bovina on Thursday, October 13th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

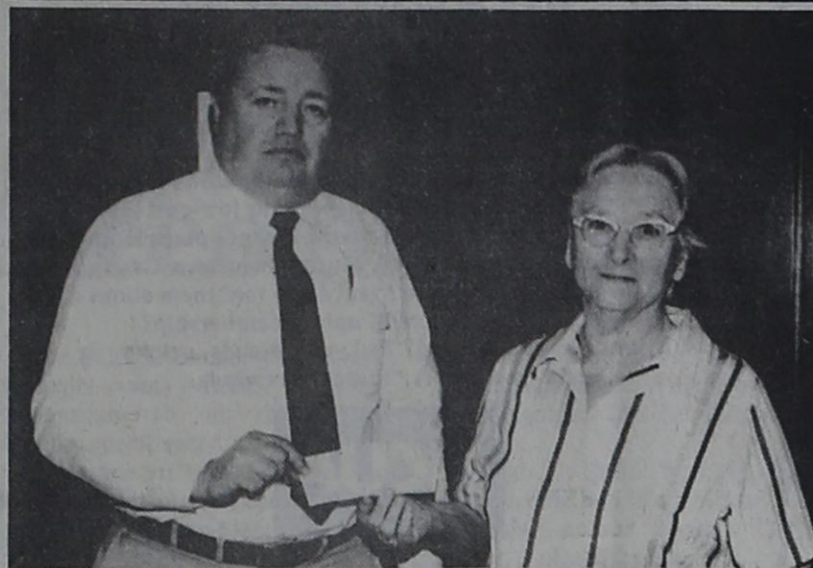
A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

## Setting The Record Straight On Vit. C

Many people have a tendency to believe "if a little is good, a lot is better." Consumers may use this adage when taking vitamin and mineral supplements, but the practice can often be dangerous.

Vitamin C is needed by the body for collagen formation, healing of wounds and resistance to infection. In addition, the absorption of iron is enhanced when vitamin C and iron are eaten together. However, Shelley Fillipp, outpatient dietician at Methodist Hospital, warns against the "megadosing" of vitamin C.

For example, pregnant women who take high doses may give birth to babies with unusually high vitamin C requirements. Unborn babies often adapt to the mother's high blood levels of vitamin C causing their own bodies to destroy the vitamin. This creates a need for larger amounts of the vitamin after birth.

Ms. Fillipp noted that other possible side effects of megadosing include gastrointestinal problems such as nausea and diarrhea, high uric acid content in the urine and interference with the white blood cells' activity in destroying bacteria.

How then do we determine, "how much is too much vitamin C?" According to Ms. Fillipp, side effects are often reported in the 1,000 mg or higher dose range. However, she stated that side

effects seem to be highly individual causing adversity for some, but not for others.

The following fruits and vegetables are outlined as excellent sources of vitamin C as well as other beneficial vitamins and minerals: red pepper, broccoli, brussel sprouts, green peppers, orange juice, kale, grapefruit juice, strawberries, one orange, raw oysters, cauliflower, turnip greens, mustard greens and collard greens.

The dietician noted that one cup portions, unless specified otherwise, provide more than 100 per cent of the recommended daily allowance of vitamin C.


She was a member of the First United Methodist Church. She married Hylton Moore February 14, 1924 in Post. He preceded her in death April 18, 1985.

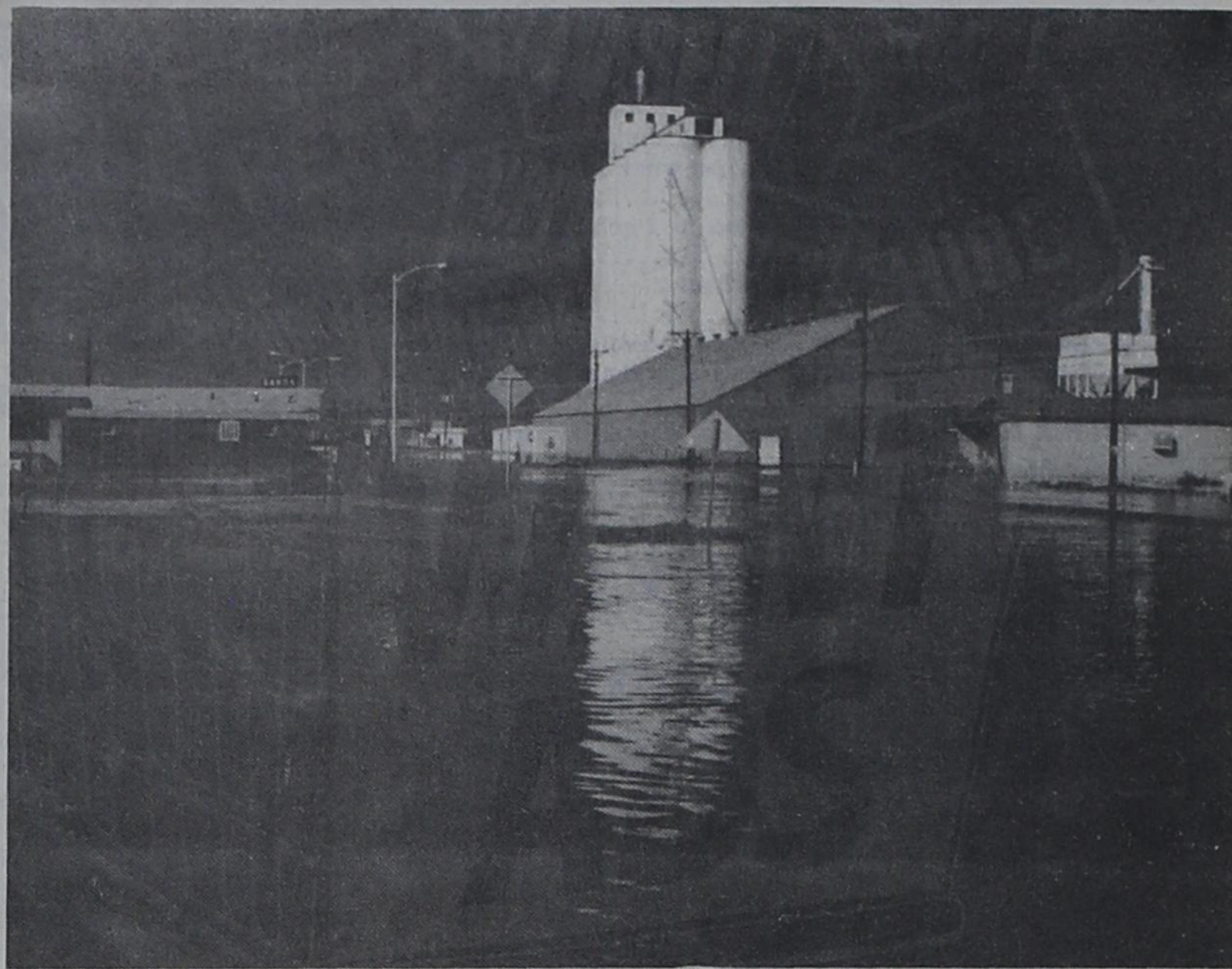

## Good Year For Grass In County

This has been a good year for grass in Parmer County, according to John Fancher of the Soil Conservation Service in Friona. Grass seed production has been very good on one year old and older plantings. The abundant rainfall this summer has really provided excellent conditions for grass growth and development.

"A lot of people believe that CRP land should look like a golf course-short grass! A lot of the grass that has been planted such as Kleingrass, green sprangletop and yellow bluestem, are grasses that can easily be waist tall or higher," Fancher said. "These types of grasses can't be kept short or they will disappear. That will defeat one of the objectives of the CRP program, which is erosion control."  
 CRP land with weeds that will blow off and cause off-site damage will be shredded before frost. "Reluctance to do timely weed control means that grass establishment can be delayed for years. This can translate to money out of your pocket for quite some time," Fancher said. "I have been watching many acres of CRP land and timely weed control is the key."

There have been seven CRP sign-ups since the beginning of the program. In two sign-ups this year, there were 34 new contracts for 4,548.1 acres. The total for Parmer County now stands at 215 contracts for 46,280 acres, of which 37,007 acres have been planted with 9,273 acres to be planted in 1989 and 1990.
