Questions and Answers On Salt Fork Dam

In the near future a confirmation election will be held in the seven area towns concerned to approve or reject the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, which proposes the dam across Salt Fork of Red River north of Hedley. The Informer is publishing a series of articles in question and answer form to acquaint the voters with the facts concerning this project.

(Continued from last week)

Q: Will there be enough income from water sales from the beginning of operations to pay the debt service on the bonds to be issued?

A: There will not be sufficient income from water sales at the beginning of operations to pay the debt service on the bonds and the reserves necessary to be established.

Q: Since there will not be enough net income from the sale of water at the beginning of operations to establish reserves and meet debt service requirements, how will this deficit be provided?

A: By a supplemental tax levy to be made by the Authority in each member city of the Authority

Q: Will this tax be levied by each city?

A: No tax will be levied by any city so it will not be charged to the taxing power of any city.

Q: Does the Authority itself have the power to levy a tax for the discharge of indebtedness and if so, how much can the Authority levy?

A: The law gives the Authority the power to levy whatever amount of tax might be needed as determined by the Board of Directors. This power is established in order to be prepared to meet any possible future disaster requirement either temporary or permanent, to protect the interests of the property owners within the boundaries of the Authority. In this instance, it is anticipated that a tax of approximately 30¢ on the one hundred dollar valuation will be required to obtain approval of the Attorney General and give marketability to the bonds.

Q: How long will this tax have to be levied?

A: This tax levy will be required until income from water sales has become sufficient to meet average annual debt service re-

quirements and establish a reserve fund in an amount equal to eighteen months' principal and interest requirements on the bonded indebtedness.

Q: Can a tax be levied without a vote of the taxpayers in the boundaries of the Authority?

A: No tax can be levied without a vote of the majority of the property-owning taxpayers; this taxing power authority will be voted upon when the bond election is held.

Q: What is the next procedure in the creation of this Authority?

A: The next procedure necessary to preserve the water rights granted to this Authority and to complete its legal status is to call what is known as a confirmation election in each member city of the Authority to vote upon the question of whether they do or do not wish to become a member of the Authority. Each city thereby gives expression to its acceptance or rejection of such membership.

Among the safety precautions to be taken when a tornado is approaching are:

1. Take shelter in a storm cellar, cave, or underground excavation.

2. When underground protection is not available, take shelter along the inside walls on the lower floors of a strongly reinforced building, or in the southwest basement corner of a house.

3. In open country, move away at right angles to the path of the approaching tornado. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or depression in order to avoid flying debris.

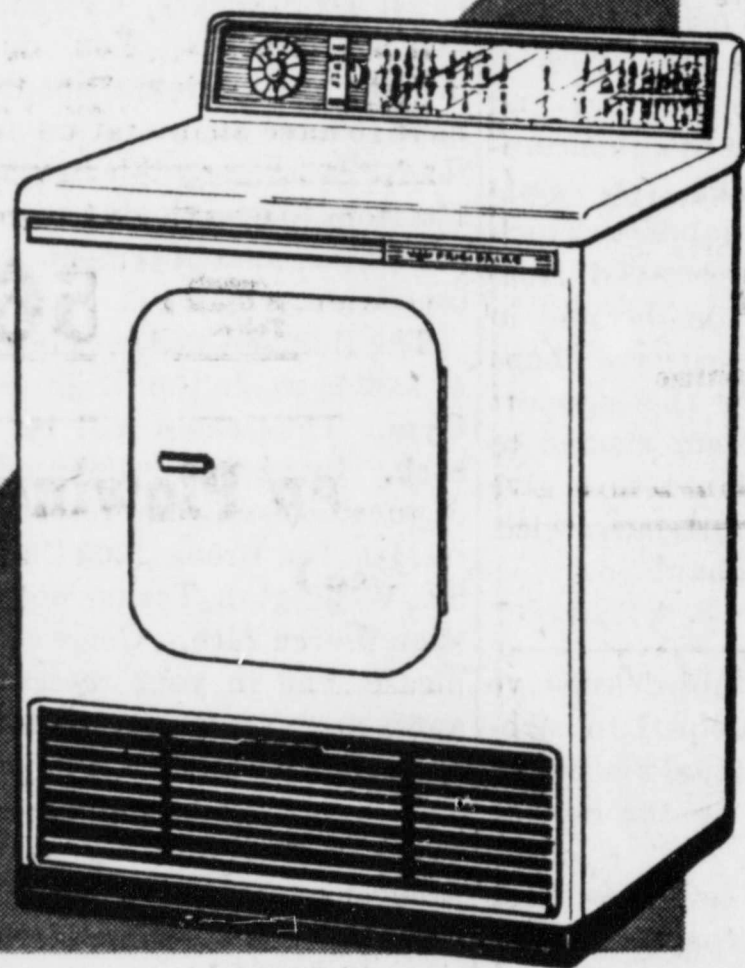

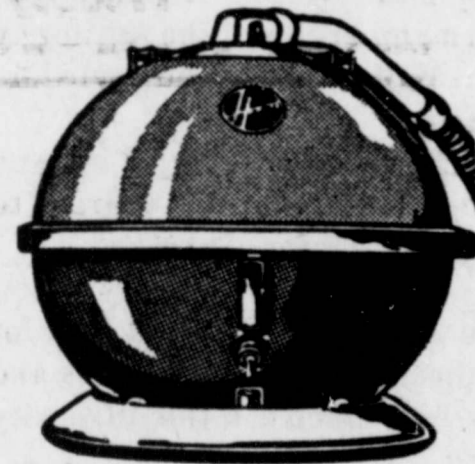
