## Questions and Answers On Salt Fork Dam

On Tuesday, May 8 a confirmation election will be held in the seven area towns concerned to approve or reject the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, which proposes the dam across Salt Fork of Red River north of Hedley. The Informer is publishing a series of articles in question and answer form to acquaint the voters with the facts concerning this project. This is the last article of the series.

(Continued from last week)

**Q:** Does this confirmation election have anything to do with the voting of bonds or water purchase agreement?

**A:** It does not, but if a city votes to remain a member of the Authority, it then becomes a permanent part of the Authority and is bound by all acts of the Board of Directors and the voters of the Authority, with the sole exception that a city may apply for withdrawal as a member of the Authority before a bond election is called if the bonds proposed to be issued are payable partly or wholly from ad valorem taxes. The conditions under which such a withdrawal would be permitted are as follows:

[1] that no water facilities had previously been provided for such city by the Authority, or [2] that no such facilities are planned to be provided for the city with the proceeds of such bonds, or [3] that the facilities planned for the city contemplate an unreasonable cost to the city. If the State Board of Water Engineers, after proper hearing, finds that any of the foregoing conditions are true it then may eliminate the city from the Authority.

**Q:** Who has a right to vote in the confirmation or other elections of the Authority?

**A:** Property owners only, who have paid their poll tax, have the right to vote in these elections.

**Q:** How are the Board of Directors to be named?

**A:** The governing body of each city in the District will appoint one property owning taxpayer who does not hold any other public office as a member of the Board of Directors. The Directors will serve on a rotation basis, with each town having one member on the Board of Directors at all times.

**Q:** What cities now have definite membership in the Authority?

**A:** Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis Wellington, Childress, Paducah, and Quanah.

**Q:** Are the above named seven cities the only ones in which confirmation election is to be held?

**A:** Yes, these are the only cities named in the legislative act. However, this does not preclude other cities from purchasing water from the Authority or by legal process hereafter becoming a member of the Authority.

**Q:** Should this confirmation election fail to carry, will this water supply still be available to this area for later consideration?

**A:** This is questionable for the reason that information comes that the State of Oklahoma is vitally interested in this water supply for irrigation purposes and a plan has been suggested to acquire this water supply in lieu of allowing water from Southeastern Oklahoma to be transported into the Dallas-Ft. Worth area. Now is the time to acquire this water supply before it goes elsewhere.

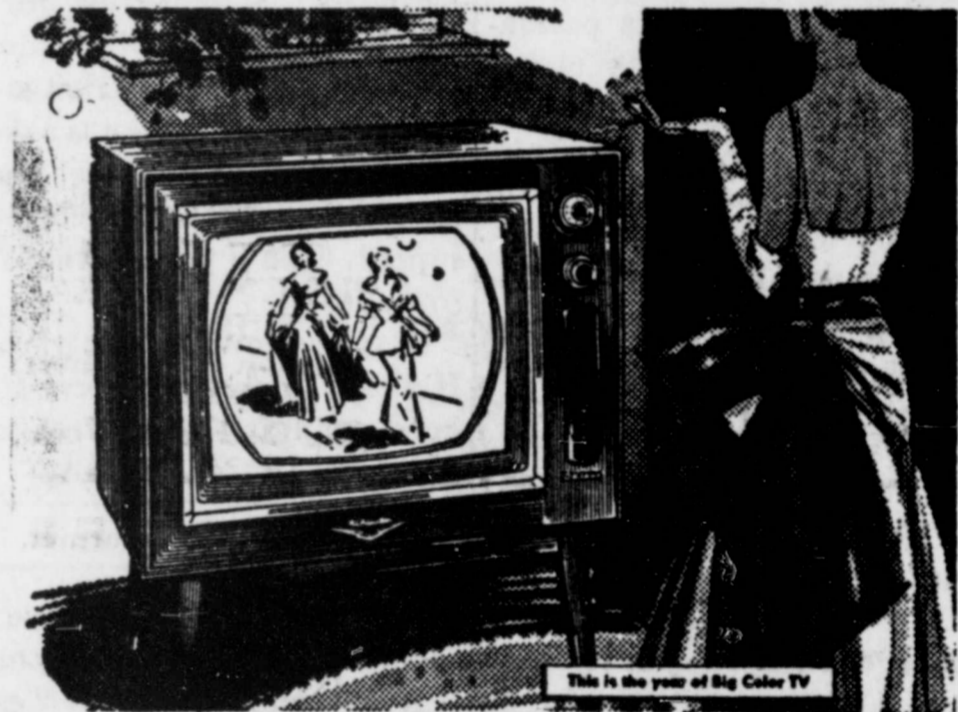

**Farm Bureau Head Denies Charge**

Waco-(Spl.)-The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has branded as an "inexcusable mis-statement of facts," a charge that he testified before the Senate Agriculture Committee in favor of flexible price supports.

J. Walter Hammond made the statement in a letter to Ernest Joiner, editor of the Rolls (Crosby County) Banner. Joiner had charged in his paper that Hammond had double-crossed Texas Farm Bureau members by testifying in favor of flexible price supports in Washington.

Hammond emphatically denied this. "Had you bothered to check the Senate Agriculture Committee records, which are public property, you would have known that I did not testify as you so stated in your column," Hammond said in his letter to the West Texas Editor.

The Texas Farm Bureau leader told Joiner that "The real tragedy of your prevarication is that you have apparently fallen into the hands of those who would like to set farmer against farmer. This is the old technique of "divide and conquer."

Hammond further stated that regardless of what farm organization farmers belong to, it is important for them "to think for themselves, using facts, instead of blindly following some rabble-rouser whose chief concern is increased circulation instead of increased farm income."
