The background was formed by branched candelabra bearing yellow tapers and greenery. Pews were marked by yellow candles tied with blue satin ribbon.

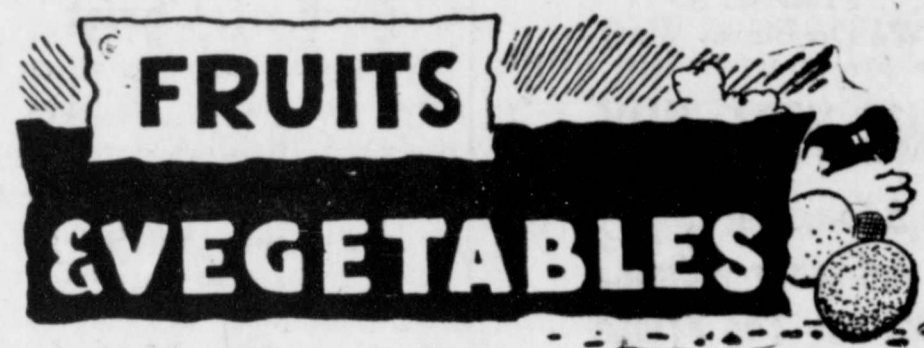
