The district 4-H Club encampment for the entire Panhandle was held June 4 to 6 at the Don Harrington Camp near Amarillo. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, and in charge of 4-H Club work in the county said that each county was given a quota of boys and girls to attend. Donley County's quota was three boys and they were selected according to how they finished in their club demonstrations.

Troy Harrison of Hedley, feeder of the grand champion steer in the county show was selected, Chuck Cospser of Clarendon, the feeder of the reserve champion steer, and Gene Floyd of Hedley, the feeder of the third place steer. All three of these boys showed in major shows over the state and placed with high honors. Troy Harrison showed for the championship in the Odessa and Amarillo shows and placed both of his steers in the first four in the Houston show with over two hundred steers in each class. The Cospser steer placed sixth in the Angus Class with about the same number in his class.

Salt Fork Dam

A meeting is being called in the near future at Childress of all the towns in the water district and a date will be reset to hold the election. Plans now are to hold this election sometime in August.

Samples of the water in the river are being taken daily by W. M. Snelson and sent to the Water Division of U. S. Geological Survey for analysis. All tests so far have proved that the quality of the water is much better than the standards required by the Health Department.

Highway 366

Indications are now that the proposed U. S. Highway 366 will soon become a reality. The highway departments of Texas, Oklahoma, and Arkansas have approved this highway and it will be presented to the National Highway Committee the later part of this month.

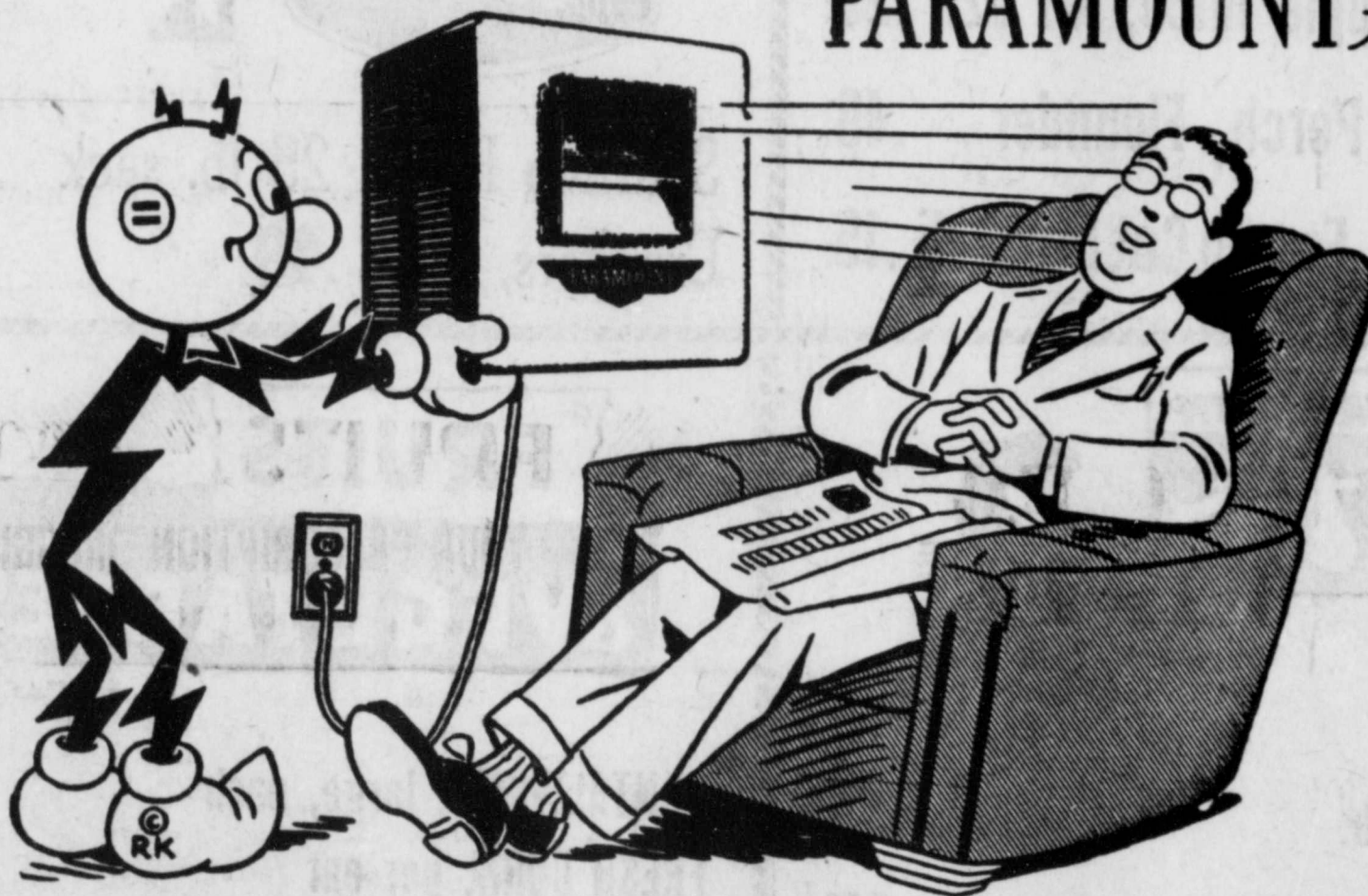
