Gilbreth Writes On Range Grasses

The following article was written by Richard Gilbreth, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Gilbreth, who is Range Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Hereford.

It is said that grass is our basic heritage. It is surely one of Texas' and the entire Southwest's most neglected resources. All grasses are not the same just as all soils are not the same. Knowing these grasses, along with forbs and woody plants, is just as important in ranching, if not more so as knowing livestock. In fact grass is what made ranching in the first place.

Once a man knows the grasses on his ranch and the few important things about these grasses he is in a better position to stay in the ranching business. Although some have put many years into studying grasses and range management it is really very simple when one looks at it in a down to earth way.

Let's take a grass plant. It is first a seed, it sprouts and comes up first depending on the food in the seed for strength. When it makes a small green leaf a process begins of taking carbon dioxide out of the air and into the leaves through small holes and making food out of it. As the plant grows larger it is capable of making more food to grow larger.

Some of this food is stored in the roots and the roots are made large and more extensive only if the top growth is permitted to grow. This food in the roots is a reserve for the plant to draw on in making seed and for early spring growth. Roots are continuously dying and decaying while others are being formed. Where these dead roots have been leaves small passage ways in the soil which makes it easy for rain water to go into the ground.

The dead litter and trash on top of the ground helps hold that water in the ground by cutting down on evaporation. So you see that you need grass to grow grass and you need water to grow grass and you need grass to get water.

A good measure that has proven to be most profitable is to take half and leave half of the annual growth for future growth. This means pounds of forage, not inches
