Services Conducted For City Woman's Sister

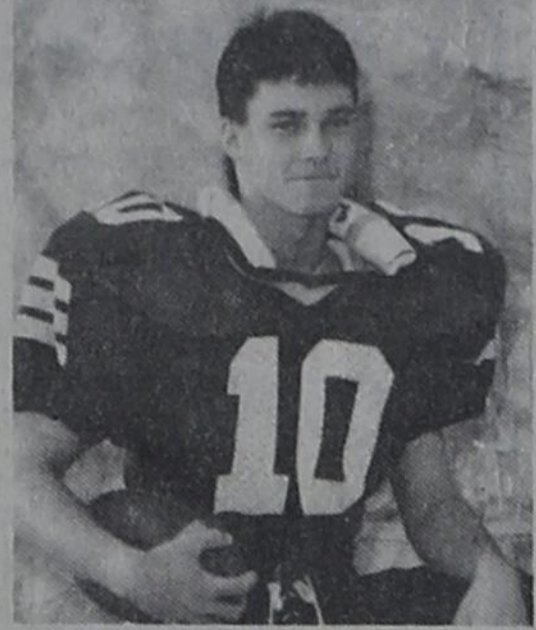
Funeral services were held Saturday for Nina Nelson, 67, of Amarillo. Mrs. Nelson died Thursday, November 24.

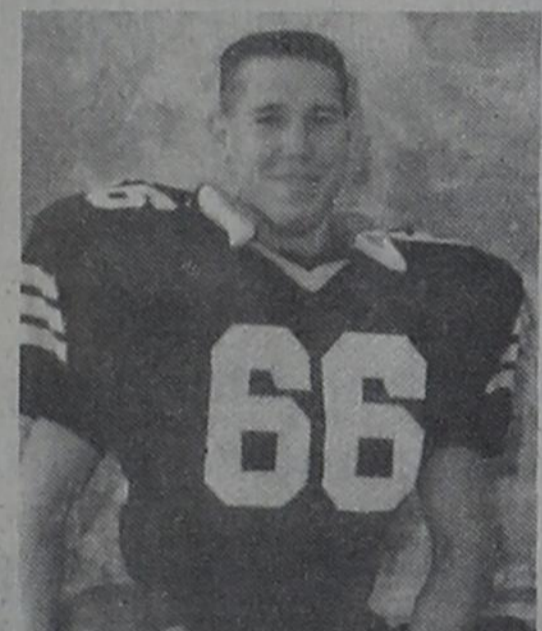

94-90 THRILLER

Farwell Guns Down B.H.S.

The Bovina Mustang cagers won their second game of the season before dropping their first game on Saturday against the Farwell Steers by a 94-90 count.

On Tuesday night, the Mustangs soared to a 99-49 win over House, N.M.

Scott Scaff scored ten first-period points to pace the Mustangs to their quick 22-8 lead in the House game.

Denver Riddle canned five baskets and Scaff added four more as the Mustangs hiked their lead to 51-22 at halftime.

Everyone got to see a lot of action for Bovina, which coasted to the win.

Scaff led all scoring with 34 points. Scaff added 25 points, McLaughlin 13 and Corey Kirkpatrick 11.

On Saturday night, the Mustangs started well enough in the scoring department, with three players, Kirkpatrick, Manuel Porras and Scaff each scoring a trio of baskets. But Farwell was red-hot, and held a 30-23 lead at the buzzer.

Scoring at that rate, the Steers would have tallied 120 points for the game.

Bovina kept up its scoring pace in the second quarter. Porras sank a pair from three-point range plus a two-pointer, and Riddle also had a basket from beyond the circle along with two regular baskets. Bovina went to the intermission trailing by a point, 47-46.

Porras had a hot hand in the third quarter, sinking four baskets and two of two from the line, and Scaff added a trio of two pointers as the Mustangs and Steers swapped leads. Bovina held the upper hand, 72-71 at the end of the period.

Foul trouble hurt the Mustangs, as Riddle had three fouls in the first half and fouled out. Kirkpatrick had four fouls. Jeff Actkinson also fouled out for the Steers.

The Mustangs got some good fourth-quarter scoring from Scaff, who had ten points, but they just couldn't hang on as Farwell claimed the win, 94-90.

Kassahn Pleads Guilty To Charge

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported last week that Lubbock cattleman Jim S. Kassahn pleaded guilty Monday in U.S. District Court to defrauding Hale County State Bank in Plainview by using the same securities as collateral for a loan at the Plainview bank for another loan at a Dallas bank in the summer of 1987.

Kassahn had not been charged prior to the guilty plea, and he waived the right to have the case presented to a grand jury. Senior U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward found Kassahn guilty of the crime, but the sentencing will not take place until a presentence report is completed.

The Lubbock newspaper said that according to information filed by the U.S. Attorney's Office, the defendant secured a \$1,875,000 loan to Fiveway Cattle Co. at Hale County State Bank on June 1, 1987, with 6,266 shares of American State Financial Corp. stock. However, he took the stock back on July 30, 1987, stating that he would be selling the stock and applying the proceeds to the loan.

The newspaper said that the bank returned the stock to him on the express agreement that it would be sold and applied to the loan, but Kassahn contacted a representative of MBank in Dallas the next day to inquire about a loan. He told the bank officer there that he needed a loan to make an estimated tax payment, according to court documents.

The Avalanche-Journal story said the federal judge spoke briefly about the plea bargain arrangement between Kassahn and the U.S. Attorney's Office. The defendant agreed to plead guilty to one count and to furnish truthful information about other violations of the law. In return, he will not be prosecuted for any activities in connection with his cattle feeding operations under various business names, according to Woodward.

The defendant has been the subject of several lawsuits. Within the last month, Kassahn and his

wife, Paula, filed a lawsuit in state district court in Parmer County against First National Bank of Amarillo alleging wrongful foreclosure, the Lubbock newspaper said. Also, a suit was filed on June 3, in Lubbock's 237th District Court against Kassahn and other directors of the failed First State Bank of Bovina by seven plaintiffs who alleged deceptive trade practices and negligence.

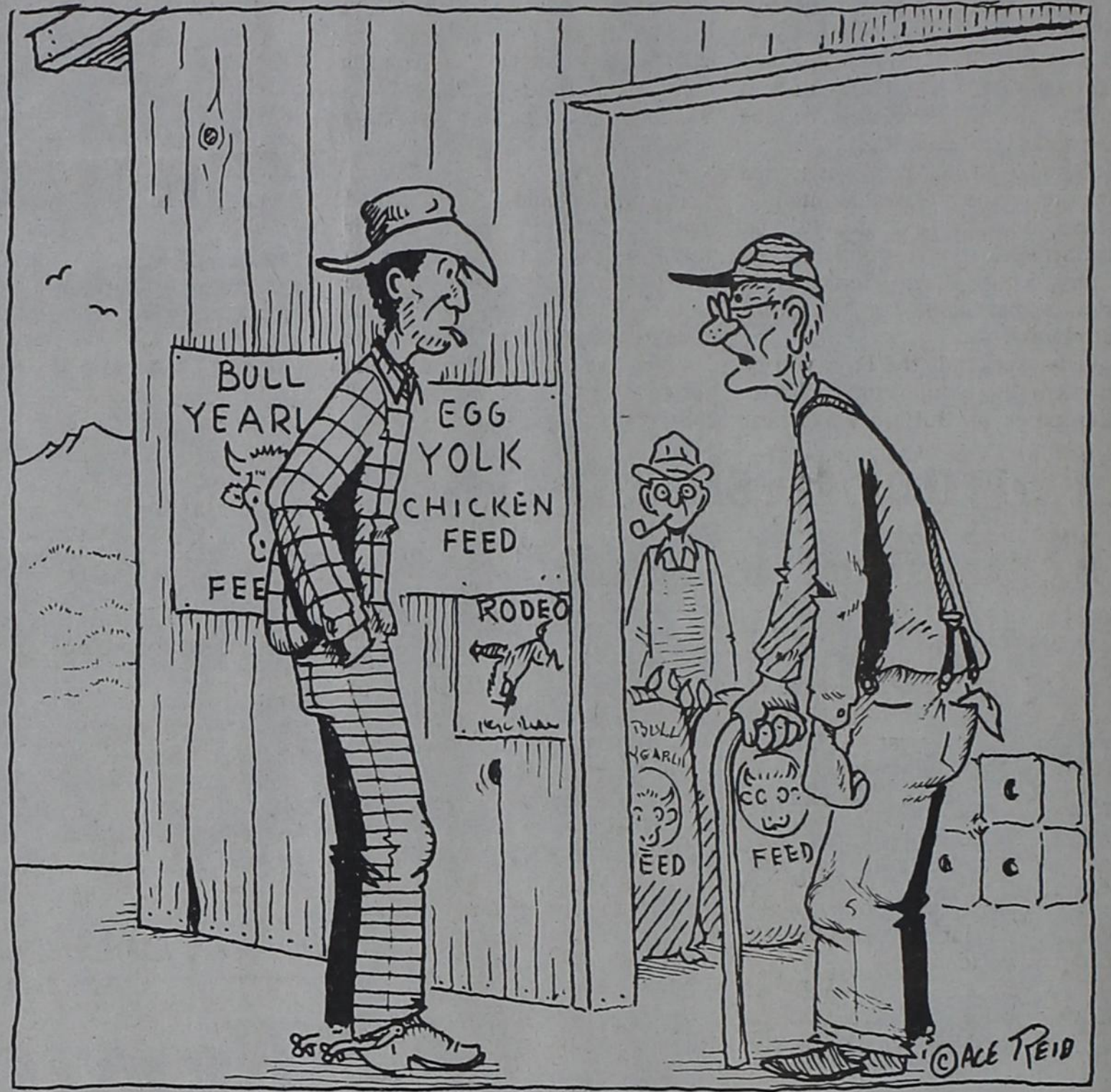

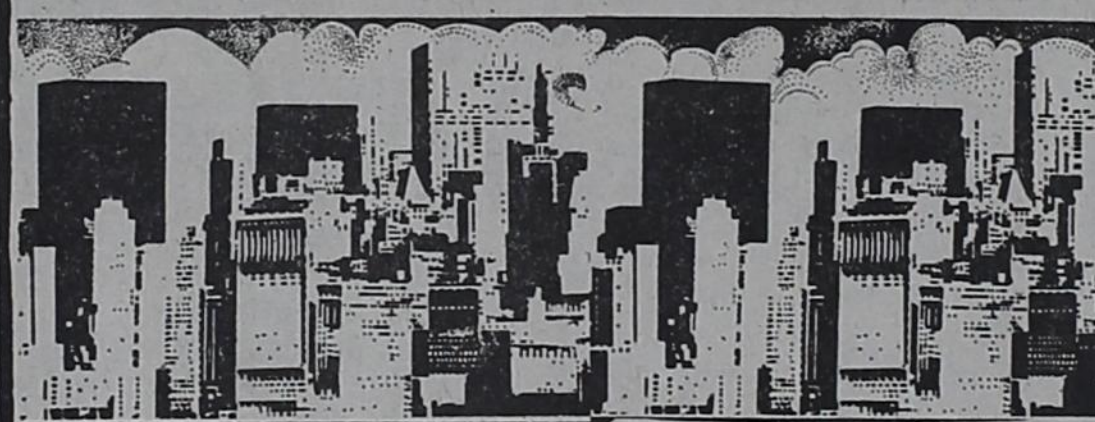

Former Resident Hurt; Daughter Is Killed

A two-vehicle accident Monday afternoon at the intersection of FM 1585 and Indiana Avenue in south Lubbock County claimed the life of eight-year-old Brandi Kelley, a third grade student at Lubbock Cooper Elementary School.

Her father, Richard Kelley, 28, of 3403 102nd St. was listed in critical condition Monday night with spinal injuries suffered in the 4:30 p.m. accident.

Two other victims suffered minor injuries and were reported in fair condition at Methodist Hospital.

Kelley and his daughter were transported to Lubbock General Hospital by CareLink helicopter. The girl died at 5:26 p.m. while being treated for multiple injuries in Lubbock General's emergency room.

According to the Department of Public Safety (DPS), Kelley was driving a brown 1985 Subaru northbound on Indiana Avenue when he entered the FM 1585 intersection.

The Subaru was struck on the

passenger side by a white 1980 Chevrolet van driven west on FM 1585 by Michael Casey Paulk of Lubbock, according to the DPS.

Paulk and his pregnant wife, Myra, are teachers with the Cooper Independent School District, according to Pat Jones, a witness to the accident. Paulk was being evaluated at Methodist Hospital for chest pains, and Mrs. Paulk suffered abrasions and bruises.

DPS troopers have not determined whether Kelley and his daughter were wearing seat belts. Mr. and Mrs. Paulk were wearing safety belts, the DPS reported.

The last report from Richard's aunt, Opal Bowen in Bovina, was that Richard was able to move both arms and legs.

Richard was enroute to the hospital where his wife, Leslie, had given birth to their son on Sunday.

Kelley lived in the Bovina area with his parents, Glen and Kay Kelley. He attended school in Texico, New Mexico, but the family were members of the First Baptist Church in Bovina and were well known in this area.
