Soil Conservation News Sophomores Elect

Another good report on the value of guar as a soil improving crop has been received. Harold White, who is farming the O. C. Sargent place, one and one-half miles south of Hedley, planted the north part of the field south and east of the house to guar last year, and combined the seed. The south part of the same field was planted to cotton. Last December when White was listing the field, he was surprised at the difference in the soil where the guar had been grown and the cotton land. He reported that he ran his tractor in second and low on the cotton land because the soil was so hard and compact, and on the guar land he could do a better job of listing and only needed the third gear.

The present cotton crop growing on the land also reflects a difference in the soil, and he thinks that the land where the guar was grown will produce at least a half bale per acre, even without additional rain, as compared to a quarter where cotton followed cotton.

According to Mr. White, a person can tell to the row where last year's guar stopped and the cotton began, by the looks of this year's crop.


