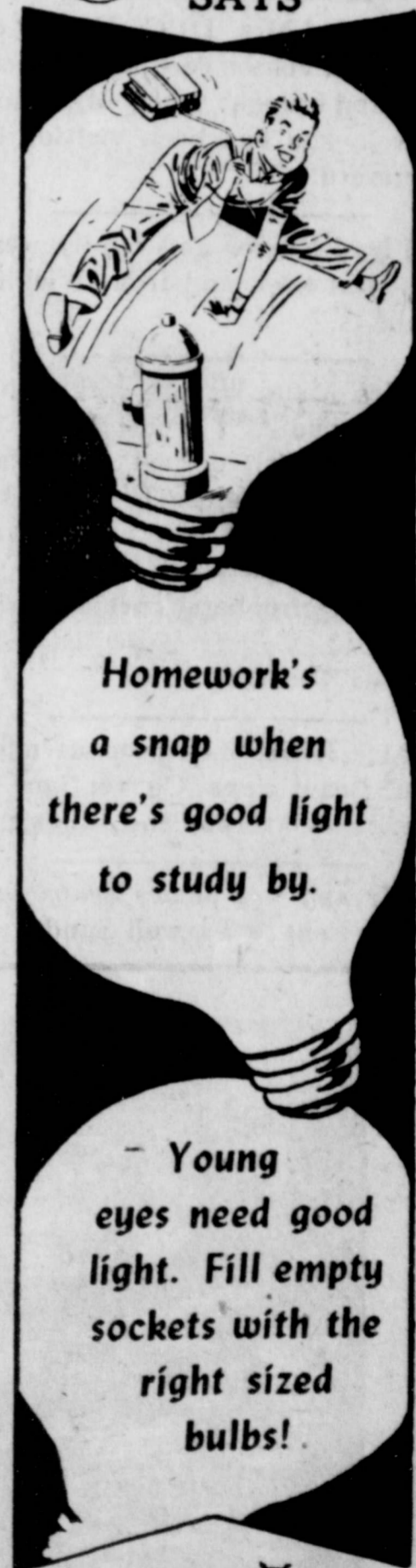
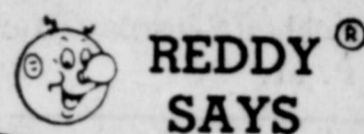
Orchestra Organized

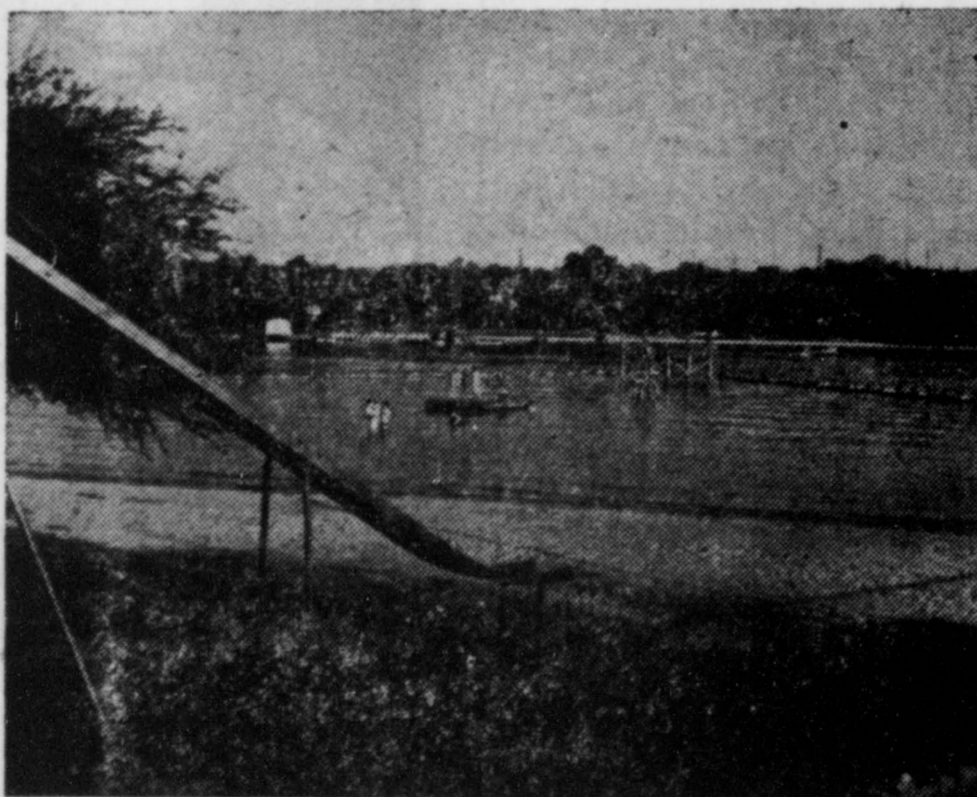
