Greenbelt Dam

A meeting of the association was held at Memphis last week with the cities of Childress, Memphis, Clarendon, Wellington and Hedley well represented. From Hedley Mayor C. H. Reid, Alderman H. H. Hall, City Secretary M. O. Weatherly and Secretary of the Association Clifford Johnson attended.

They asked for another year's extension of the water rights, voted to continue the daily water samples for another year, passed a resolution to amend the act adding a clause to eliminate the objections of some of the towns. When this act is passed an election will be held to create the water district followed by water purchase agreements and the bond election. The clause in the act needed will be that any town can withdraw from the district any time they wish before the bonds are voted, regardless of how they voted in the previous elections.

It is hoped that all the towns vote into the water district as the larger the district the more chance of getting State or Federal aid. With some outside aid the project can be put over with very little tax, if any.

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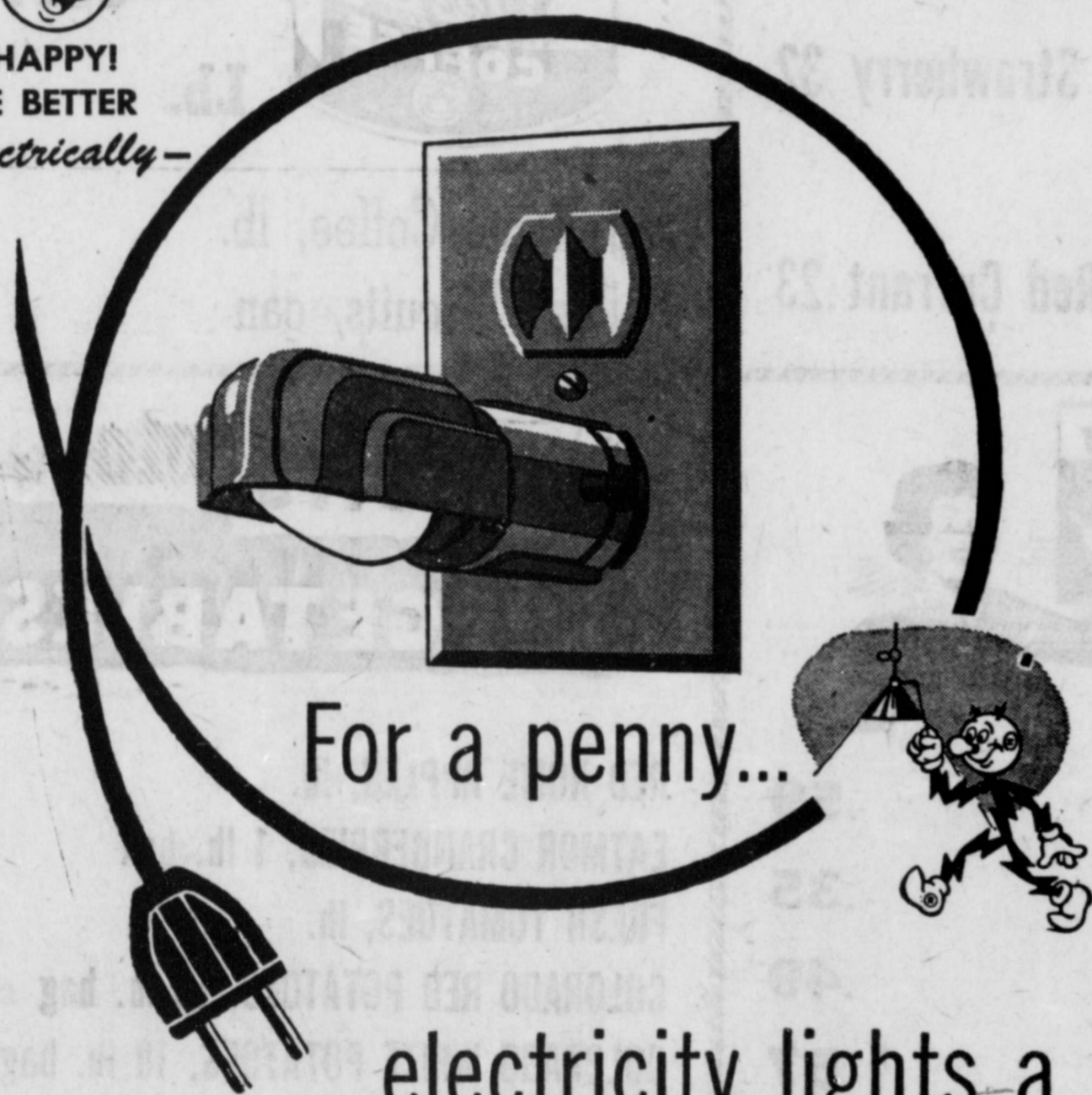
