Fat Stock Show

Donley County 4-H Club boys showing calves at the Odessa Hereford show placed their steers in the top of the heavy and middle weight classes says County Agent H. M. Breedlove. The boys did not top either class but they were in there fighting. Only one steer was sold at Odessa from the four steers being shown and he belonged to Troy Harrison of Hedley and weighed 1106 lbs. and brought 51 cents per lb. for a total of \$564.06. The other top placing steers were taken from the sale to go on to the Amarillo show, Fort Worth and Houston. Breedlove says that a total of 17 4 H Club steers will be shown at Amarillo. The Donley County grand champion steer shown by 4-H Club girl Jean Harrison of Hedley will be shown at Amarillo and the steers of Gene and Janice Floyd and Troy Harrison, along with others from the county. Seven made the trip to Odessa for 8 days, this included some fathers with Troy Harrison and Gene Floyd, the total expense of eating was \$9.70 per person and there was no hotel bill as the big 4-H Club bus accommodated all on the trip. Breedlove did most of the cooking but Ed Floyd and Ellis Harrison put a mixture of food in the skillet now and then. The bus is a real money saver for show trips and sure gives the boys more profit on their feeding projects.
