Mrs. Lillie Sullivan

An Oklahoma ranch woman, prominent in church affairs and sister of a pioneer resident of Hedley died late on Jan. 17. She was Mrs. Lillie Sullivan, sister of Mrs. J. B. Masterson and oldest of four daughters. Roy P. Stewart, writing in his Country Boy column in the Daily Oklahoman, characterized her as a capable cattle raiser and dealer who bore the appearance of one placed among teacups. He described her as "The small, pretty woman whose appearance mocked at her 75 years as she laughed at some of the jokes life played, who hauled feed in a buggy for her first 12 cows in 1915, who fought weather, depressed prices, drouth and sharpsters building up her land and cattle; the dainty lady who could sit on a fence and eye grade cattle ready for market." She once made the statement that "Cowmen never had an easy time of it. Even when times were good, price wise, they had no easy time, because even then they had to work hard." Tribute was paid to her faith in her own business acumen, and for the rearing of her boys.

She annually gave dinners for those associated with her in church work. For thirty years she was chairman of her ladies' circle, named after her, first in the Broadway Baptist and then in the First Baptist Church of Ardmore, from which her funeral was held on Jan. 19. The Lottie Moon missionary offerings regularly benefitted from her generosity.

She had made a number of visits to Hedley.

The Hedley boys received a price above that of the average junior exhibitors because of his tribute to their efforts to produce better livestock. The boys are extremely grateful to him for this recognition.

Of the 27 boys enrolled in F F A sixteen are feeding fat animals for showing purposes. The remainder of the boys have breeding, feeding, poultry, crop projects, etc. The boys feeding show animals have a greater initial expense and spend a great deal more time and effort in caring for their animals. The entire cost of the projects for showing is considerably greater than the other projects. However, a boy takes greater pride in his project and a keener interest in his work when he faces competition.

A number of the local business men have expressed an interest in these boys and their work and want to show their appreciation by contributing materially to these boys who have had the added expense and work in preparing their animals for the stock shows.

Ehrle to Co-Sponsor Texas Feed Law

Austin—Will Ehrle has announced that he will co sponsor the proposed Texas Commercial Feed Law during the 55th session of the Texas Legislature.

In his release Ehrle said, "The State of Texas has long been negligent in failing to provide adequate and safe standards for commercial feed products in order to protect our Texas farmers and ranchers."

This legislation was introduced at the last session but failed to receive a majority vote and consequently did not pass the House of Representatives.

"I am hoping," Ehrle said, "that we will be able to secure early passage of this most important legislation. This law at the present time has the support and backing of every farm group, livestock organization, and grain and feed dealers association in the state."

"In these times of drought I feel that everything we can possibly do to assure our farmers and ranchers of getting value received for every penny spent should and must be done."

Representative McIlhany of Wheeler will introduce the bill in the House. Representatives Latimer of Abilene and Ehrle are co-sponsors.
