Senator Andy Rogers Introduces Bill

Austin, Texas, Feb. 5-Second and habitual offenders against Texas liquor laws will face stiffer penalties under a bill inroduced by Senator Andy Rogers of Childress dealing with bootlegging offences.

Senator Rogers, of District 30, said in a statement today that "The bill as I have introduced it is absolutely necessary if we are to protect our youth and human life, especially in the so called 'dry' areas of the state." Sen. Rogers said that stronger penalties are needed because "in too many cases the criminal bootlegger simply treats the fine as a business expense and goes on selling his booze whenever he can-to every man, woman or child.

Under Senate Bill 187 by Sen. Rogers, persons convicted of a second or additional offense, of bootlegging "shall be guilty of a felony, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than five hundred dollars (\$500) nor more than five thousand (\$5,000), or shall be imprisoned in the State penitentiary for not more than five years, or both." The bill would change provisions of the Texas Liquor Control Act which now impose fines not less than one hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars or one year in the county jail or both.

While present statutes treat meanors, the Rogers bill would make any second or additional offense a felony and subject to the increased penalties.

"No one knows better than the citizens and the law-enforcing agencies of the counties and cities of District 30 what a terrible problem this is," Sen. Rogers said. "I sincerely hope that passage of this measure will provide an added bulwark against this sort of criminal activity."
