## Greenbelt Dam News

The Amendment to the bill allowing the water district to be created and allowing us to proceed with the work on the Greenbelt Dam as scheduled passed both the Senate and House, and is now waiting for the Governor's signature. The bill passed both houses by large majorities and no trouble. An early signing of the bill is expected.

As soon as this amendment becomes a law and the necessary time for advertising the election has elapsed an election will be called. This election will be held at the same time in all seven interested cities. The cities voting in favor of this will create the water district. They will have first choice on the water, however water can be sold outside the district with the permission of the directors of the district.

Meanwhile daily sampling and analysis of the water in the river is being taken. Monthly meetings of the association are held and plans and details of building the dam are discussed. It is also hoped that a paved road can be made to the dam site before construction begins.

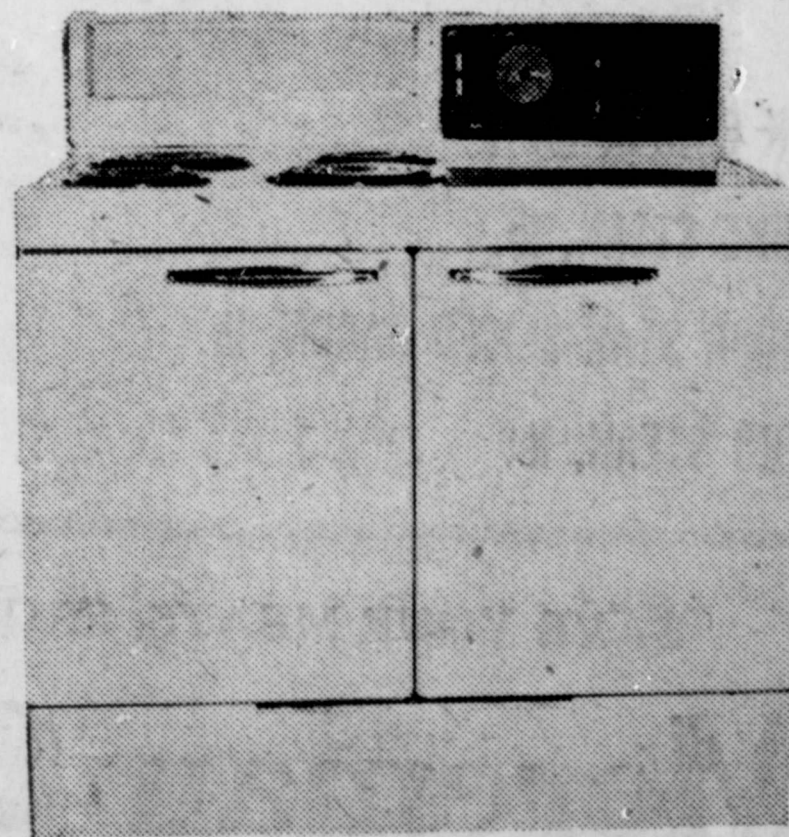

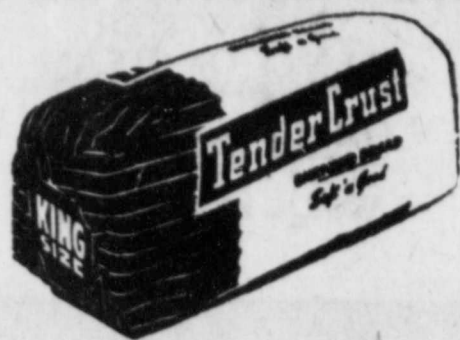

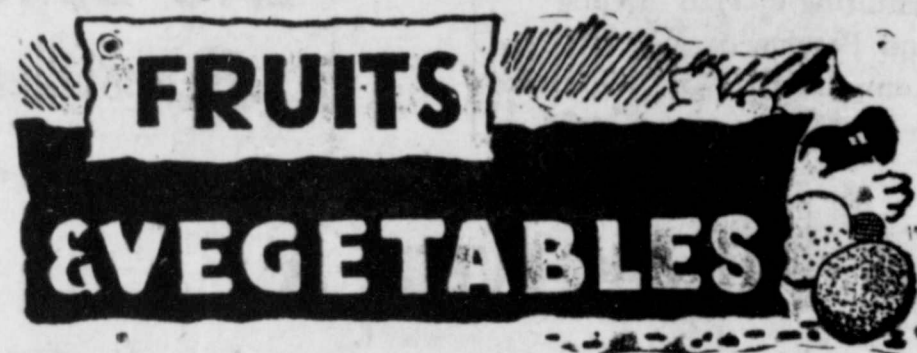
