What does it profit society if all of our opinions on public issues are readily aired, if they are based on closed minds instead of mature reflection? There is no such thing as an ignorant democracy. Men vote their feelings, and these feelings are compounded of emotions and reason. The latter element ought to be a great part of any man's vote.

It is informative to realize that one-party states helped to ruin Italy, Germany, the USSR, and Japan, and that the lack of a strong two party system keeps France in turmoil The interdependence of our economy, both nationally and world wide, is apparent to all observant people. Just how far small nations can trust our foreign policy is quite question just now.
