Hall, Sam Sanders and Edgar Beach were elected without opposition. Sam Sanders was elected for two years, while Hall and Beach tied. By the flip of a coin Hall received a two year term and Beach a one year term. Holdovers on the council are Leon Foster and Ansil Adamson.

Mayor C. H. Reid was elected last year for a two year term.

Only 17 voted in the school election last Saturday, there being no opposition to arouse interest. L. D. Moore and Ed Floyd were elected to serve on the board.

Holdover trustees are W. A. Hansard, W. B. Wiggins, Leonard Baggett, Harold White and Ray Altman.

On Guam

Anderson A F B, Guam, M. I — Staff Sergeant Carter L. Huffman, son of Mr and Mrs. W. H. Huffman, Hedley, Texas, has begun an overseas tour on Guam with the 54th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron Typhoon Chasers.

His new squadron, under the command of Lt. Col. Howard L. Berg, has the responsibility of tracking typhoons and tropical storms across 5½ million square miles of the Western Pacific.

The Hedley sergeant will be a propeller mechanic with his new squadron. Thus, considering the hazardous nature of his squadron's work, Sgt. Huffman and his fellow mechanics have an extra burden of responsibility resting on them. With emergency landing fields widely dispersed, the W B-50 weather aircraft must be kept in top flight condition so that they will be able to complete weather missions safely under the worst flying conditions known to man.

A graduate of Hedley high school in 1946, Sgt. Huffman entered the service in April 1951. Prior to coming to Guam he was stationed at Sioux City A. F. Base Sioux City, Iowa. His wife, Madonna Jean, accompanied him on his overseas trip and is residing in Agana Heights, Guam.

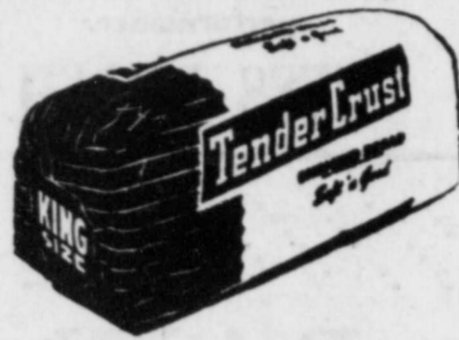
