Fire equipment from Hedley, Memphis and Clarendon finally brought the blaze under control, but not until the main auditorium was completely destroyed.

Total damage was estimated at \$30,000, and \$20,000 insurance was carried. The pastor and members of the church are going ahead with plans for rebuilding, and probably we will have a further report on this for next week's issue.
