Hedley citizens turned out in a nice way to vote in last Saturday's confirmation election. 144 votes were cast here, 142 for confirmation and 2 against.

The issue also carried in a big way in the other six towns involved in Clarendon the vote was 185 to 5, in Memphis 141 to 0, in Wellington 182 to 2, in Childress 307 to 12 in Paducah 279 to 23, and in Quanah 152 to 7.

The total vote in the seven towns was 1388 for confirmation and 51 against.
