District Governor to Visit Local Lions

The Lions Club of Hedley will welcome W. L. "Bill" Smith, District Governor District 2-T-1, Lions International, which includes 87 clubs in this section of the state. Lion Smith is in the cotton and cotton gin business in Ralls and has been active in civic and state affairs for many years. He is the present mayor of the city of Ralls. Governor Smith, prior to becoming district governor, was president of the Ralls Lions Club for 2 years, and has served as zone chairman and deputy district governor of this district.

District Governor Smith will visit the Lions Club of Hedley at 8 p. m. on Sept. 12. The purpose of his visit will be to advise and assist President J. S. Hinds, Secretary M. O. Weatherly and the Officers, Directors, and members of the Club on matters pertaining to Lions administration and the Lions' great program of humanitarian service.

Lion Smith is one of the 306 District Governors who supervise the activities of the 13,220 Lions Clubs. Lions International was formally founded in 1917 in Dallas Texas, and during the past 40 years has become the largest, most active, and fastest growing service club organization in the world. There were on June 30, 1957 Lions Clubs in 82 countries or geographical locations of the world with a membership of over 556,115. During the fiscal year of 1956-57, 1,008 new Lions Clubs were organized.

The Lions Clubs' special mission is the promotion of good government and good citizenship, the development of civic, educational, social and moral welfare of the community and nation, and to help create and foster "a spirit of generous consideration among the peoples of the world." 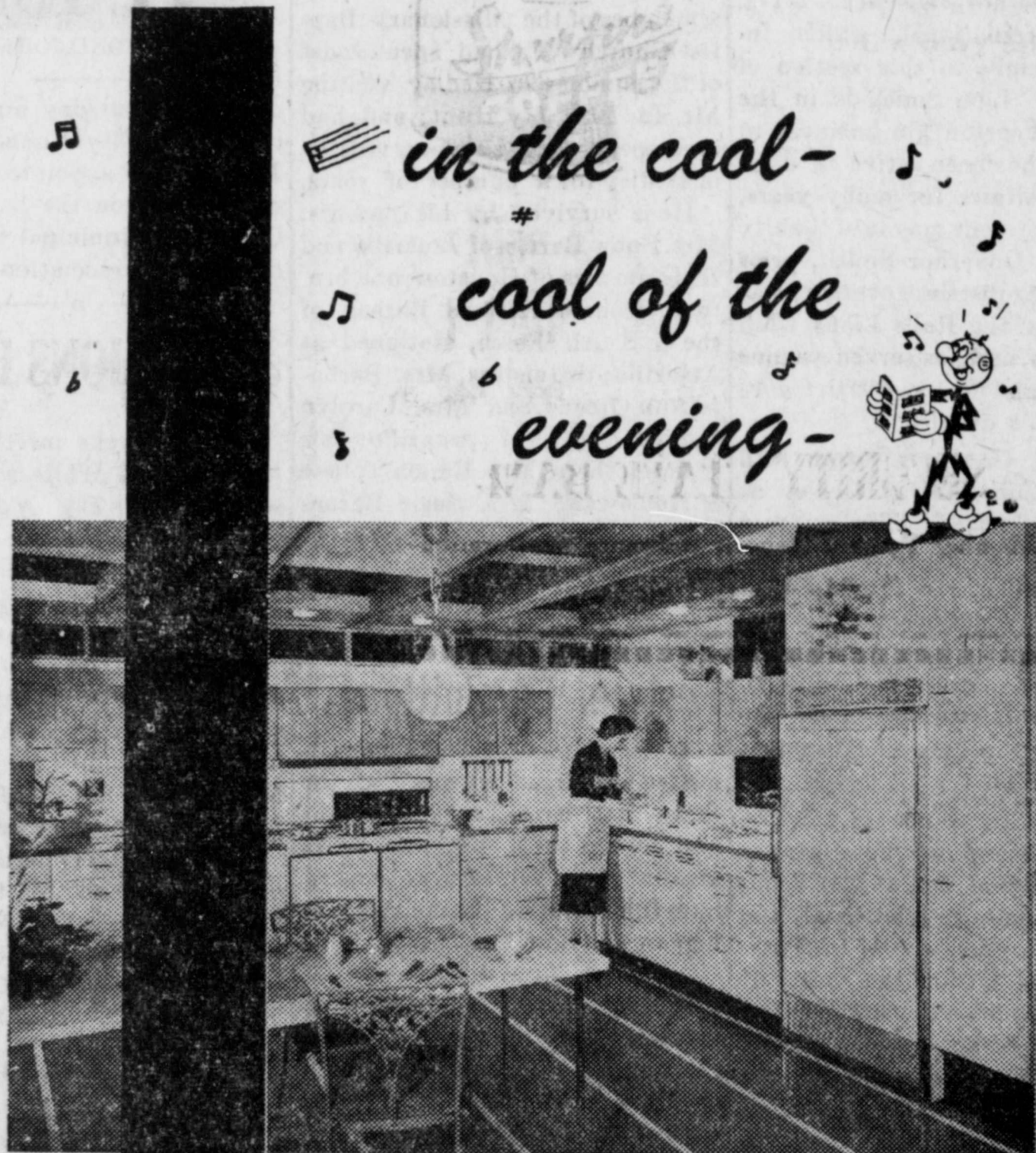

Basketball News

We have been talking to Coach Don Haskins and learning Hedley's plans and prospects for the basketball teams this year. Two tournaments are forthcoming in the local gym, a Freshman tournament on Nov. 21, 22 and 23, and a high school tournament on Dec. 12, 13 and 14.

For the high school girls, all but two of last year's team, which won the postseason Turkey tournament are returning this year, and there is a nice squad of girls, all of whom can do a good job on the team, and who are capable of developing a good team with hard work. Mr Haskins thinks that the team has, in Judy Wynn, one of the best free-throw artists in this part of the country. Among the guards are Linda Davis, Mary Baker, Nancy Lou Hinds, Mildred Sims, Loveta Houdashell, Jennette Hansard, Ollie Jo Brown and Sharon Davis. Forwards include Judy Wynn, Cherry Thomas, Tobytha Sanders, Patsy Alexander and Colleen Younger. Betty Lou Sanders will play either guard or forward. Last year's team won 15 and lost 13.

The high school boys lost three Seniors by graduation, Terry Bailey, Joe Wood and Jerry McCarty, all of whom were on the first team. Terry and Joe are now playing for Clarendon Junior College on athletic scholarships. This will make experience the determining factor in this year's squad. However, the team is in better shape than at this time last year, and is more determined than at mid-season last year. They are trying hard and really want to have a ball team. Mr Haskins also reports that he has as good a bunch of Freshman boys as can be found in this area. He reports that one of the biggest improvements in the team is the attitude of two Seniors, Merle Owens and Donald Youree. The team must be built around the most experienced members, and if they have a good attitude, it is felt throughout the squad. He feels that their shooting is better than usual for this time of year, and expects Donald Youree to be one of the best rebounders in this area. Merle Owens has improved very much in shooting and all around team play, and he expects him to be a great help since he has more experience than any other Owl. Billy Wiggins, Bobby Roland, Dale Morris and Rodney Hargrove have improved remarkably in a year's time. Don Cox has good ability as a shooter and has improved very much on rebounds and defensive work. Jimmy Don Waddell is a good play

maker and defensive player and has improved his scoring. Lewis Bevers is a Senior who did not play last year but has good ability and could help a great deal. Mr. Haskins also expects a lot from a Freshman group of Bill Maddox, Wendall Stone, Bobby Roland, David Morris, Jerry Kinney and Bobby Stephens. Their value to the team depends on hard work on their part. Rounding out the squad are R. E. Butler and Trent Bolin.

This team will be attempting to better last year's record of 20 wins to 10 losses. Mr. Haskins says that these boys are short on experience, but win, lose or draw, will give the fans their money's worth.
