Mustangs Improve But Lose, 21-7

The Bovina Mustangs continued to show improvement in their 21-7 loss at Hale Center last Friday.

"We had our opportunities. We could have won the game if we had taken advantage of our opportunities. We were inside their ten-yard line twice and didn't score," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley.

In fact, Bovina found themselves on Hale Center's nine-yard line after their first play from scrimmage, but couldn't cash in for a score.

Flanker Vicente Munoz scampered 61 yards on an end-around play, finally being hauled down at the Owls' nine by a Hale Center defender. The Owls' defense stiffened and took over the ball without allowing a Mustang score.

Bovina's offense improved considerably from its previous game. "We continued to improve, but we were still not consistent enough to win. However, the game was a far cry from the 59 points Hale Center scored against us last year," Talley said.

Talley also had words of praise for Bud Venable, who was moved to tailback in an attempt to give Homer Renteria a little rest. Although in the new position, Talley said that Venable ran well.

The Mustang coach said that Bovina's offensive line showed some improvement, allowing the team to move the ball better than it had in its first two games.

"Our special teams also played well, especially Manuel Porras," Talley said. Porras scored Bovina's first touchdown of the

season by recovering a fumbled punt in the Hale Center end zone.

Bovina's touchdown came with 2:56 left in the third quarter, with Hale Center holding a 14-0 lead. Bovina punted, and Hale Center's return man, Tim Silva, muffed the punt and allowed it to roll into the end zone.

Porras, a 110-pound freshman, alertly pounced on the ball for the Mustangs' first score. Bud Venable made good on his first kicking attempt, to cut the Owls' lead to 14-7.

However, Hale Center responded with a 79-yard touchdown drive to regain control of the game. Silva, who misplayed the punt, got the TD on an eight-yard run with 11:14 left in the game. The contest was homecoming for Hale Center.

ERS Program Will Be Explained Here

The public is invited to the First United Methodist Church for a program that will explain the Emergency Response Service (ERS) program Wednesday evening at 7:30 p.m.

The ERS is a program operated by Lutheran Social Service of Texas, and gives elderly and disabled adults 24 hour access to emergency assistance. Help is available at the push of a button.

Most elderly people wish to remain in their own homes or neighborhoods for as long as possible. Yet, some of them have serious illnesses or disabilities that may suddenly become critical. Some people fall and are unable to get up or to call for assistance. Many emergencies occur at night when individuals are alone and neighbors are asleep.

Illness, disability and the inability to summon help are of deep concern to the elderly, their friends, and relatives. Consequently, some people have been prematurely institutionalized or forced to live with persons outside their familiar environment.

Emergency Response Service is a system using a device connected to a telephone. By pushing the button on the main unit or the hand-held unit, the person sends a signal to the Response Center, based at the Home of West Texas. If the phone is not answered, designated friends or relatives are called on to investigate. Fire, police, or ambulance services can also be called if needed.

A 24-hour timer, if not reset daily, sends a signal in the event a person is unconscious or unable to push the button to call for help. The Lutheran Social Service of Texas has a contract with the Texas Department of Human Services (TDHS) to provide ERS to those persons meeting their eligibility criteria. Currently, the monthly fee is \$16.25 locally, \$21.75 long distance. The Emergency Response Service is available in the counties of Lubbock, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Crosby, Dickens, Terry, Bailey and Parmer.

Parmer Co. Tax Rate Is Down

The Parmer County Commissioners set a lower tax rate Monday.

The new county rate is .22452 cents, compared to the current .2250. The new road and bridge fund rate is .07045 cents, compared to the current .0707.

Thus, the new overall rate is .29497 cents per \$100 valuation, compared to the current .2957.


It will be a place to house the ambulance, store equipment, training center, and also a kitchen area for meeting places for clubs or other organizations in Bovina.

School Corner

Under the present state fiscal setup, schools are funded according to the best four of eight weeks. The first four week period comes in the Fall semester and the second four weeks in the Spring semester. The Fall count will be the four weeks in October.

School attendance is important not only from an academic point of view but also a financial point of view. State funds are based on average daily attendance (ADA). Bovina Schools receive from the state approximately \$1400 per student in ADA. When a student is absent this decreases our ADA, which in turn, decreases our state dollars. State money lost has to be made up at the local level through taxes.

Bovina Schools presently has a PK-12 enrollment of 467. A 98 per cent attendance rate during the month of October would produce an ADA of approximately \$457.66. This will produce about \$641,000 in state funds. A 94 per cent attendance would produce about \$615,000. This four per cent difference in ADA would cost the school district over \$26,000 in state funds. These have just been examples, but hopefully they will help you to see how critical each student's attendance is to the






