Cotton Festival

All Cotton Festival committees and others interested in helping with the Festival are urged to meet at the Lions Den next Thursday night. The committees met last week and some good reports were turned in. It looks as if most of the committees are at work.

State Representative Will Ehrle of Childress says he will attend the Festival and speak in regard to what is going on at the special session of the Legislature. Lions International Counselor W. T. (Dub) Nelson now of Dallas will be on hand and lend what help he can. Attorney Paul Spillman of Wellington will be here again and make one of the opening addresses.

The Maverick Club tumbling team of Amarillo will be here and perform Saturday afternoon of the Festival. They also will perform during the parade, doing their trampoline acts if a trailer large enough to hold their net can be obtained.

Two booster trips were discussed and possibly the first one will be Saturday, Oct. 12. The committee appointed was Dorothy Brinson, V. T. McPherson, L. D. Messer, Harold White and D. E. Boliver but others are asked to work with the committee as there is not much use making a trip unless a large caravan will go. Several present said they would take their cars.

All in all the committees are hard at it giving their time and efforts to make this our biggest and best celebration. Vice Chairman Aubrey Lee Cherry says he will take off from work the entire Festival week and devote his energies to the Festival and the 50th Anniversary celebration.

The 50th Anniversary celebration part of the Festival will be under the Old Settlers Committee, headed by W. H. Clay, President of the Donley County Pioneers Association. They are making an effort to get every old timer to attend, including the first child born in Hedley, who was Anita Culwell, now Mrs. W. L. Hilton of Mercedes, Texas.

Jesse Sewell Hall

One of Hedley's most highly regarded old timers died Saturday morning when Jesse Sewell Hall passed away at his home near here. He was 87 years of age.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the First Christian Church by Rev. Tom Posey, pastor of the Paramount Terrace Christian Church of Amarillo, and Rev. Paul Hancock, pastor of the Hedley Church. Burial was in the Clarendon cemetery with Murphy Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were L. D. Moore, Tommy Bain, Carl Naylor, Emmett McFarling, Herlie Moreman and W. E. Grimsley.

Mr. Hall had been a resident of Hedley for 55 years, coming to this area before there was a town of Hedley. He was a member of the First Christian Church here.

He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. F. B. Mullins of Stratford, Miss Myrtle Hall of Hedley, Mrs. Floyd Naylor of Wichita Falls and Miss Alma Hall of Amarillo; three sons, C. H. Hall of Forest, N. Mex., D. K. Hall of Panhandle and J. R. Hall of Hedley; one sister, Mrs. Myrtle Brown of Dallas; and two brothers, G. P. Hall and W. J. Hall, both of Dallas. His wife, Mrs. J. S. Hall, preceded him in death Feb. 15, 1946.

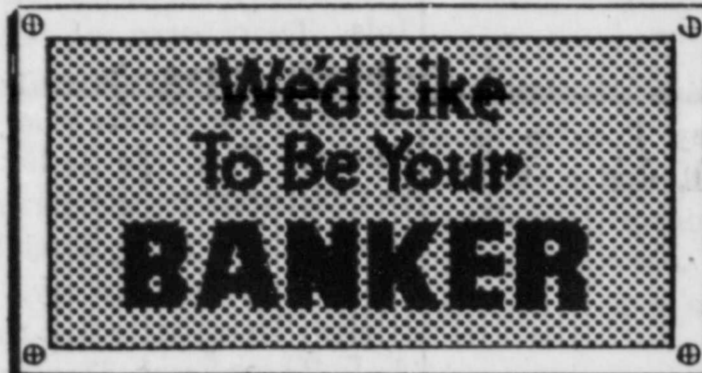
