Doherty Elected

At an election meeting held at the Hedley school last week, W. P. Doherty of Hedley was re-elected to serve as supervisor from Zone 4 on the Donley County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors.

The Donley County Soil Conservation District is divided into five zones, and each year a supervisor is elected by his fellow land owners from one zone to serve for a five year term. These supervisors serve without pay and should be recognized by their fellow residents of the District for their efforts in promoting soil conservation in this District. W. P. Doherty has served on the Board since 1947, during which time he has held the office of vice-chairman and is at present the Board's secretary. Establishing soil and water conservation on this land of ours is a much bigger and more important job than most people realize, and the locally organized Soil Conservation Districts is the democratic way of getting the job done.

The Legion Auxiliary will have the cake walk Friday and Saturday of the Festival. Anyone who will donate a cake please leave it at Johnson Dry Goods.

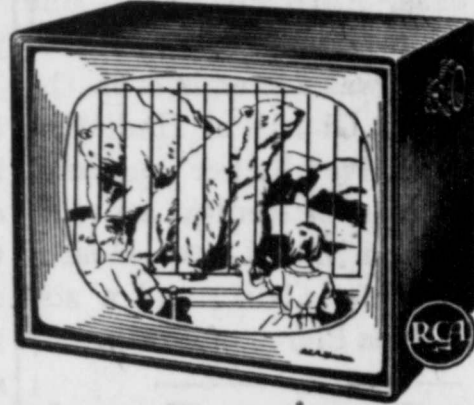

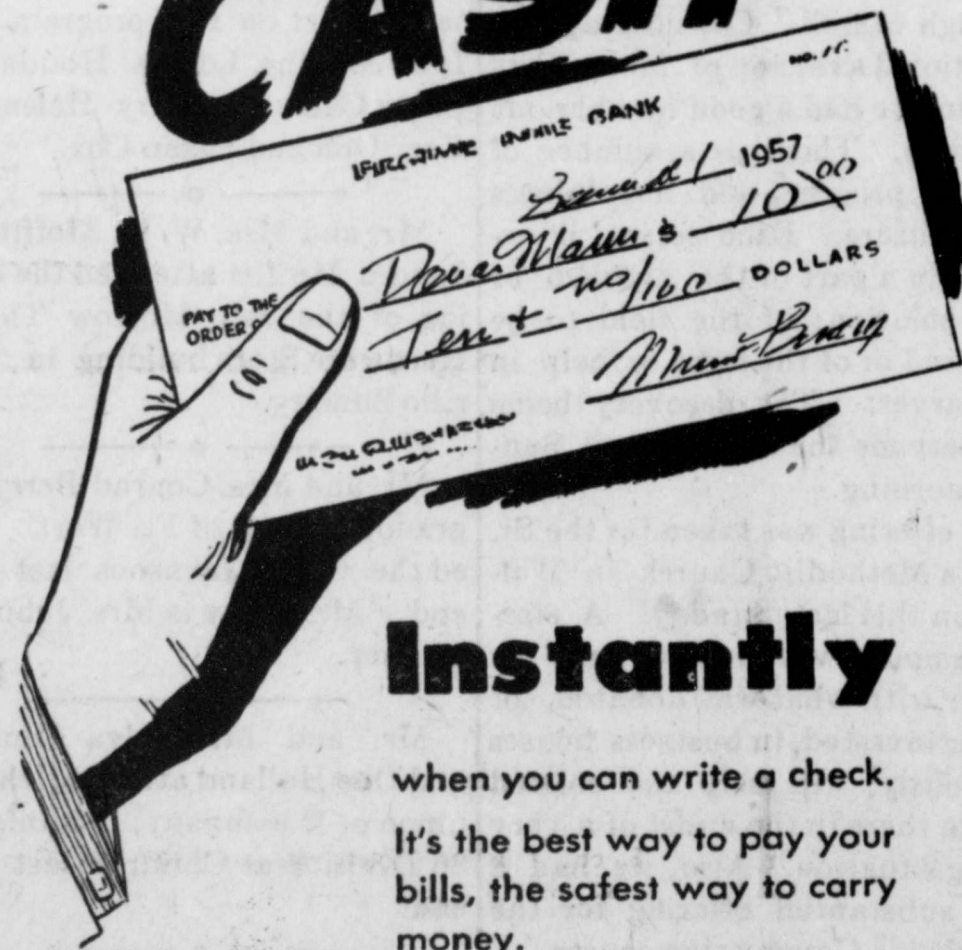

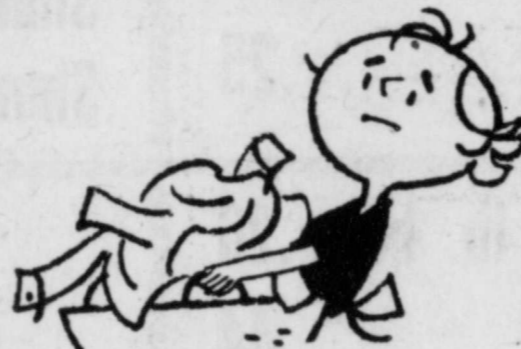
