## County Hale-Aikin Report Protested

The following protest was mailed this week to the Hale-Aikin Committee of 24 carrying the signatures of over 300 local citizens. The article is self-explanatory. Hale-Aikin Committee of 24 Drawer A A Capitol Station Austin, Texas

Ladies and Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned citizens of Donley County, Texas, hereby protest the report of the Donley County Committee of 29, purporting to present the ideas and thoughts of 105 people, who made the Hale-Aikin School Study for Donley County, and as grounds for such protest, submit the following:

1. The report of the Donley County Committee of 29 was never presented to the 105 people who made the Hale-Aikin Study for Donley County; and

2. The report does not represent the conclusions and recommendations of the 105 people who made the Hale-Aikin Study for Donley County, because:

(a) Neither the 105 people who made the study for Donley County nor a majority of the people of Donley County as a whole, believe that the schools in Donley County, should be consolidated on a county-wide basis.

(b) Neither the 105 people who made the study for Donley County, nor a majority of the people of Donley County as a whole, believe that the office of County Superintendent should be abolished and the duties thereof administered by the County Judge.

We submit and earnestly insist that if a consolidation be necessary, that it be on a smaller unit than the county wide basis; and, we further submit and earnestly insist that the office of the County Superintendent should be continued and that such office is rendering valuable services to the schools of Texas.

## Rep. Leroy Saul Announces Candidacy For State Senate



Leroy Saul, Kress, has announced his candidacy for the State Senate from the 30th Senatorial District.

The district includes Bailey, Farmer, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Castro, Motley, Hall, Donley, Collingsworth, Childress, Armstrong, Swisher, Hale, Briscoe and Floyd Counties.

Saul, who has lived in Swisher and Hale Counties for the past 33 years, was a classroom teacher and administrator in the Runningwater, Prairieview, Petersburg and Kress schools for ten years. After moving to Kress 12 years ago, he was a farmer, publisher of the Kress News, and now owns a cleaning establishment there.

Saul was first elected to the House of Representatives from the 89th Legislative District in 1952, and has served six years, being elected twice without an opponent. Saul is a lifelong undeviating democrat.

During his six years in Austin, Saul served as vice-chairman of the Water Resources Committee, was one of two Texans appointed to serve on the Southern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments special committee on water policy and was chairman of the inauguration committee for the state governor in 1957. He was also chairman of the House temporary Rules Committee, which adopted the Code of Ethics for the House in 1957, he was chairman of three of the temporary committees appointed by the

Speaker in 1957, and has served on the following permanent committees since his first election in 1952: chairman, Conservation and Reclamation; vice-chairman, Rules; vice chairman, Labor; member, Agriculture; member, State Affairs; member, Appropriations; member, Transportation; member, Elections; and member, Highways and Roads.

Saul said his platform will be:

1. Ground water belongs to the owner of the land and therefore must be kept free of state or federal control;

2. Those who have not kept faith with the public must be removed from positions of trust and responsibility.

3. The same economy that the intelligent farmer and businessman uses in running his affairs can and must be extended to state government.

4. Local self-government is our tried and proven way of life. Any further trends toward further centralization in state and federal must be ploughed under.

5. An Education second to none for every child.

"I've tried to make you a good hand as Representative, and now I'm asking you for a promotion," Saul said. "I'm running on my record, not promises for the future. I urge you to check my record in detail and then decide for yourselves whether you want to promote me to the Senate."

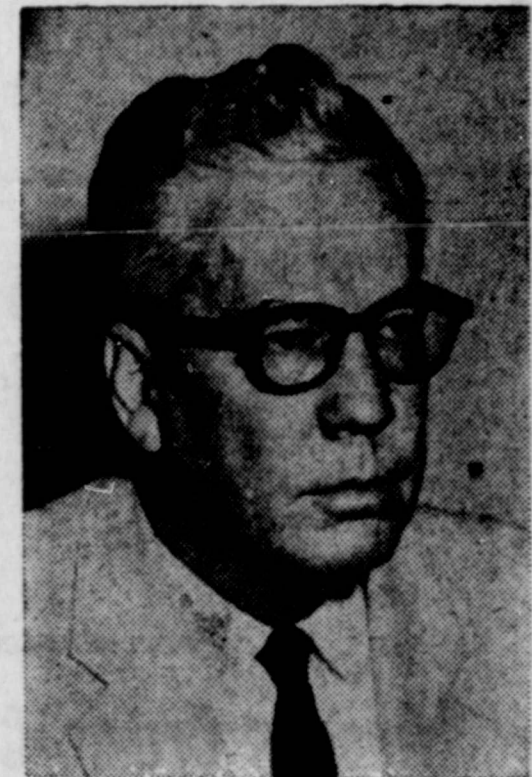

### Karl Lovelady Speaks To the Farmers



I believe in a broader "Farm-to-Market" road program, by trying to get an additional \$50,000,000 per year to the amount now spent, for more farm roads

I believe in a much broader rural electrification and rural telephone program so that every farmer will benefit.

I would like to see a state supported experimental farm, to be located in the heart of the vegetable growing district, for experimentation in the growing of vegetables.

I would support a program to conserve our surface water supply by the state expending money for the construction of dams on all rivers and draws where needed. (In doing this we would also have places for recreation right here in West Texas)

I would amend the present employment law so that the Texas Employment Commission would bring into any given area suitable labor to be used on the farm where said labor is not locally available at the time when this labor is most needed by the farmer.

I would vote for and support a stronger seed regulation law in order to put this state on a par with other states in seed regulation I will always oppose any legislation to unionize farm labor.

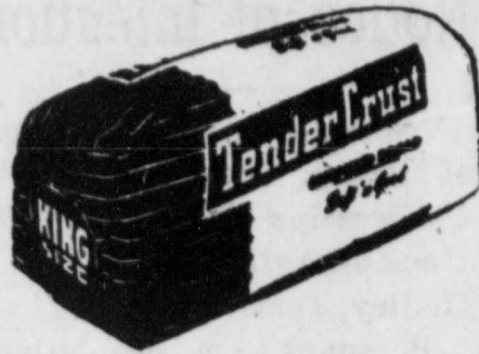
