At this time, Practice E-3b, Chiseling or Listing will be approved limited to the acreage covered by cotton stalks on land that was summer fallowed or idle and does not now have a cover of any kind on it. Land now in feed stubble or small grain will not qualify. The listing or chiseling must be completed by Jan 31, and reported to the county office not later than Feb. 15

The County Committee Policy with reference to 1959 A C P Cost-Share assistance is as follows:

Each Donley County producer will be limited to \$1250.00 cost-share assistance for 1959 unless, in order to complete a good soil and water conservation practice, it would take more cost-share assistance to have the practice completed, then the State and National limit of \$1500.00 will apply

Bank Deposits Up

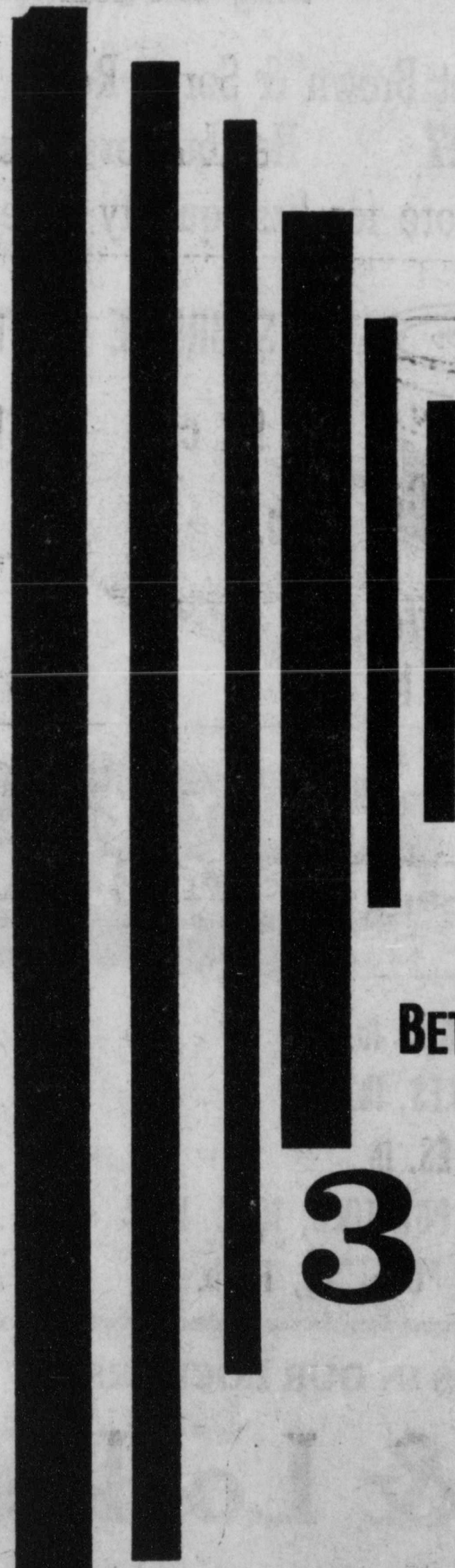

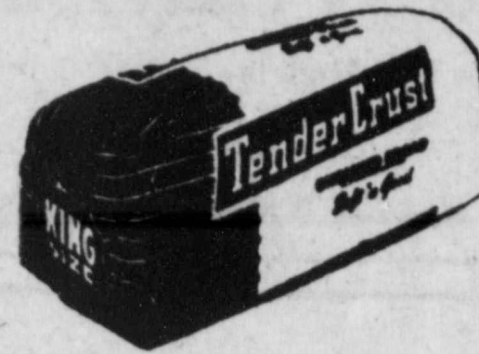
