Scattered Shots

Continuing last week's column on cars:

In 1914 Henry Ford pioneered the minimum \$5 00 a day wage. The same year the first coast to-coast highway, the Lincoln highway was begun. In 1919 Oregon collected the first state gasoline tax. By 1920 there were 15,000 filling stations. Four wheel brakes came in 1923. Balloon tires came in 1924. A milestone came in 1925 when for the first time more closed cars than open ones were made.

Another nuisance appeared in 1935, when the first parking meters were used in Oklahoma City. In 1922 there were only 600 tourist courts and camps. By 1940 they had grown to 14 000.

Perhaps someone might like to know when his favorite car was introduced. The first production Oldsmobile was offered in 1901. The first Studebaker was in 1902. The first production Buicks, Cadillacs and Fords came out in 1903. The first Oakland, now Pontiac, was in 1908. The first Chevrolet was in 1913. The Dodge came out in 1915. The Lincoln was introduced in 1921, the Chrysler in 1924, the De Soto and Plymouth in 1928, the Mercury in 1938. The Rambler came out in 1902, its name was changed to Jeffery in 1914, and changed again to Nash in 1917.

Contrary to popular belief, the Model T was not the car which established Henry Ford as the giant of the auto industry. Instead it was the Model N, which was produced in 1906, and carried the Ford name around the world. It likewise made \$1,000,000 in profits, which financed the development of the Model T.

No doubt this is enough about cars to satisfy you for a while.

They then won from Lelia Lake 60 to 25 with Lesley making 17 points, Maddox 10, Wiggins 9, Meador 8, Hargrove 5, Kinney 5, Butler 4 and Roland 2. Then they defeated Claude in the finals 74 to 48. Lesley made 24 points, Wiggins 21, Roland 16, Maddox 11, Hargrove 1 and Butler 1.

The entire community is certainly proud of these boys and coach Don Haskins for this accomplishment. The Owls will play Miami for the bi-district crown at Pampa next Monday night at 8:00 o'clock and a good delegation of Hedley fans is expected to attend.

Sanders made 21 points, T. Sanders 19, Alexander 3 and Wood 1. In the second game B. Sanders made 26, T. Sanders 15 and Alexander 11. The girls were scheduled to play Samnorwood in the district playoffs on Wednesday and Friday nights of this week at Quail, and we are still certainly pulling for them to also take the district title.
