Roy L. Taylor of Matador this week announced his candidacy for State Representative from the 88th District, consisting of Childress, Donley, Hall and Motley counties, and declared the major pledge in his campaign would be strong and unwavering opposition to a state personal income tax or retail sales tax.

Taylor, a life-long resident of Motley county, is a graduate of Matador High School, attended Texas Tech, and is presently completing work at the University of Texas in public accounting and business. He has been active in civic work, especially in youth work, having served as a district leader in Boy Scout work and having devoted many hours to service as a unit leader.

At the University of Texas he was president of the Men's Independent Campus Association and a member of Alpha Phi Omega, a national service fraternity, Intramural Council, Goodfellows and the "T" Association, the association of lettermen of the University of Texas.

Taylor, 26 years old, served two years in the U. S. Army from 1953 to 1955 and was released with 30 per cent disability. He is still a member of the United States Army Reserve.

While working his way through the University of Texas, Taylor has made an intense study of governmental affairs and is well acquainted with the work of the Legislature.

In his statement announcing his candidacy, Taylor declared:

"Many matters of great importance will come before the next legislature. These matters call for Representatives with deep convictions. They call for Representatives who can be trusted to stand firmly by what is right and honest in spite of pressure from political groups.

"Our state and nation is taxing our people beyond all reason. Too much of the taxpayer's dollar is being lost through waste, extravagance, inflation and corruption. We must put an end to this and to the parade of higher and higher taxes.

"Taxes at all levels of our government are too high, a condition which can be corrected only by a careful and complete examination of governmental operations, fol-

Lubbock—Judge James G. Denton has announced candidacy for his first elective term as Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, Seventh Supreme Judicial District. Judge Denton was appointed to the office last October following the death of Chief Justice E. L. Pitts. He will run in the May 7th primaries as a candidate for the Democratic Party's nomination for the office.

Denton was judge for the 99th Judicial District (Lubbock County) at the time of his appointment to the Court of Civil Appeals. He served as District Judge for six and one half years. Before that he served nearly two years as judge of the Lubbock County Court of Law. He has also served on the Executive Committee of the State Judicial Conference.

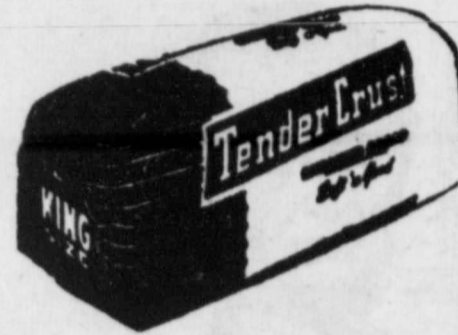
