Funeral services were held Thursday from the First Baptist Church here by Rev. A. L. Teaff of Moran, assisted by Rev. S. A. Wolfe and Rev. L. J. Crawford. Burial was in Rowe cemetery under direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Allie Craddock was born in Taney County, Missouri, July 30, 1888, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Craddock. She came to Roxton, Texas, with her parents at the age of six and lived there several years, then her father sold his farm and bought land at Enloe, Delta County, Texas. There she met Milt W. Mosley and they were united in marriage in 1904. Mr. and Mrs. Mosley moved to Midland in 1906, and in November, 1907, came to Hedley. Except for six years at Clarendon, while Mr. Mosley was sheriff of Donley County, and about six months at Fort Worth, the family has lived in Hedley continuously since that time.

The Mosleys are the parents of five children, two deceased. Their oldest child John Vestal Mosley of Pampa, passed away in June, 1941. Their youngest child, Allie Opal Mosley, passed away in 1914.

TAKE NOTICE that on the 12th day of September, 1960, the Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, will pass an order authorizing the incurrence of claims and accounts against the Road and Bridge Fund of the County for the purpose of acquiring and purchasing lands necessary for the rights-of-way in respect of U. S Highways and Texas State Highways in said County, and to defray all expenses incidental thereto, and which said proposed indebtedness will not exceed the principal sum of Sixty Thousand and no-100 Dollars (\$60,000.00).

FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that by the same order the said Commissioners' Court will authorize the issuance of time warrants, bearing interest at the rate not exceeding 5% per annum for the purpose of paying and cancelling the indebtedness evidenced by such claims and accounts against the Road and Bridge Fund of the County, and which said time warrants will mature serially over a period of years, the maximum maturity date to be the 15th day of May, 1981, and the said Court will levy a continuing direct annual ad valorem tax out of the Road and Bridge Fund Tax authorized by Section 9, Article 8 of the Constitution, for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the indebtedness hereby proposed to be created, and which said indebtedness will be in due course represented by such time warrants when and as the same are issued and delivered.

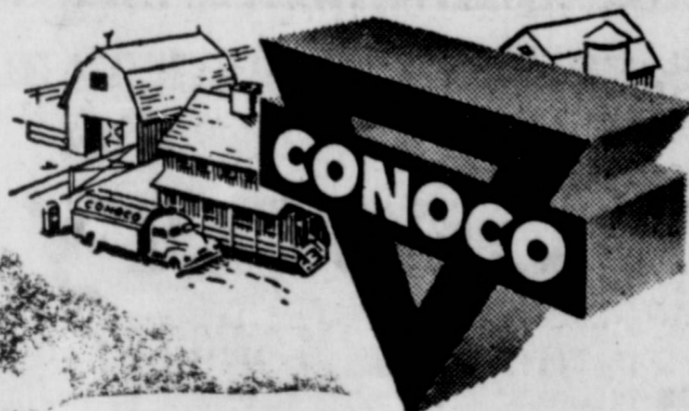
