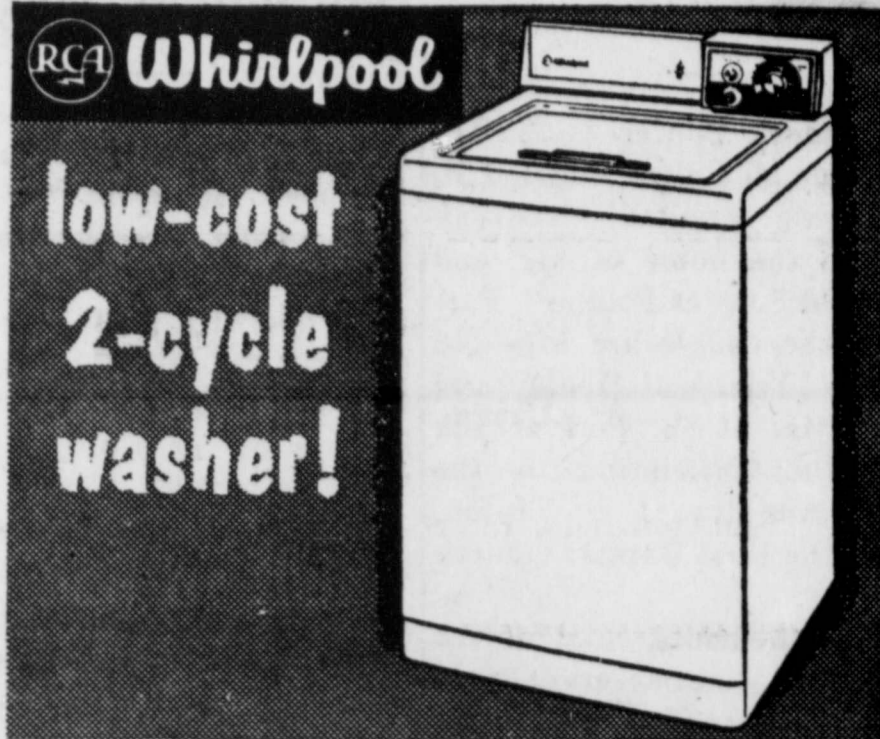

Greetings:

Cotton, which has played so vital a role in the development of Texas, remains one of the agricultural mainstays of its economy. Value of cotton produced in this State exceeds \$20 billion and this crop's service to mankind is beyond measure.

Nine years ago, Hedley Cotton Festival was launched under joint sponsorship of the local Lions Club and Booster Club to celebrate and give thanks for the bountiful cotton crops produced in this area.

Residents of the entire Texas Panhandle are invited to Hedley for the two day Festival, climaxed by the coronation of the Queen of Cotton. Seven thousand persons have attended each of the eight previous Cotton Festivals in Hedley, a town of 500 population.

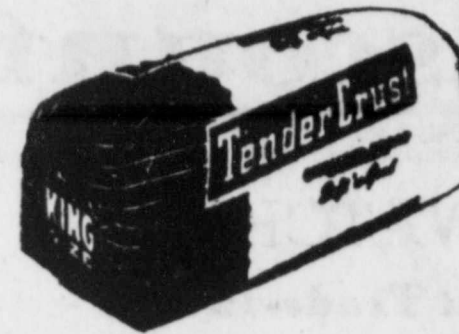
