Dear Dr. Townsend:

We have now received all eight of the logs of the core borings of the Collingsworth Dam Site on the Salt Fork of the Red River, the last of which was sent you by the Bureau of Reclamation on June 22, 1961. The logs of these borings, together with the topographic maps of the reservoir sites and the five year record of the quality of the river water, will enable us to complete the feasibility report on the Greenbelt Project. We anticipate that the feasibility report will be completed within ten to twelve weeks.

We have felt that at least five years of record of the chemical quality of the river water was needed before we could pass judgment on the feasibility of a municipal water supply reservoir on the Salt Fork. The mistake which was made on Lake Kemp, in respect to its use as a municipal supply for Wichita Falls, was due to an insufficient record of chemical analyses of the river water. We now have some five years of analyses of daily samples of the Salt Fork water and believe that we are in position to safely predict the quality of the impounded water after concentration by evaporation.

The time required for obtaining a sufficient record of the quality of the water has been used to advantage by: (1) securing the creation of the Authority by the Legislature, (2) obtaining water rights from the State Board of Water Engineers, (3) the topographic mapping of the possible reservoir sites, and (4) the core boring of two dam sites all at a minimum cost to the member cities of the Authority. The State Board of Water Engineers, the U S Geological Survey, and the Bureau of Reclamation have expended approximately \$68,000 for mapping the reservoir sites, for core boring the dam sites, for making flow measurements, and for half of the cost of analyzing the daily samples of river water. have spent approximately \$8,500 for collecting water samples and paying half the cost of analyzing the samples. The total cost of securing the data, upon which we will base the feasibility report, approximates \$76,500.

Another favorable development, during the time we have been waiting for a sufficient record of quality analyses, has been the creation of the Texas Water Development Board. During its recent session, the Legislature authorized the Development Board to loan 100% of the cost of a Texas water supply project not to exceed \$15,000,000. Heretofore, the Development Board could loan only one third of the cost, not to exceed \$5,000,000. Due to the fact that the Texas Water Development Board requires the borrower to establish rates which will provide revenues with only one to one coverage of interest and principal payments, rather than the more usual one and-one-half to one coverage, this fact will have an important bearing on the financial feasibility of the project.

We are anxious to get this project "buttoned up" one way or the other and trust that the feasibility report will show the project to be sound. However, we would like for the interested parties to be advised as to why we could not make the feasibility report before now.

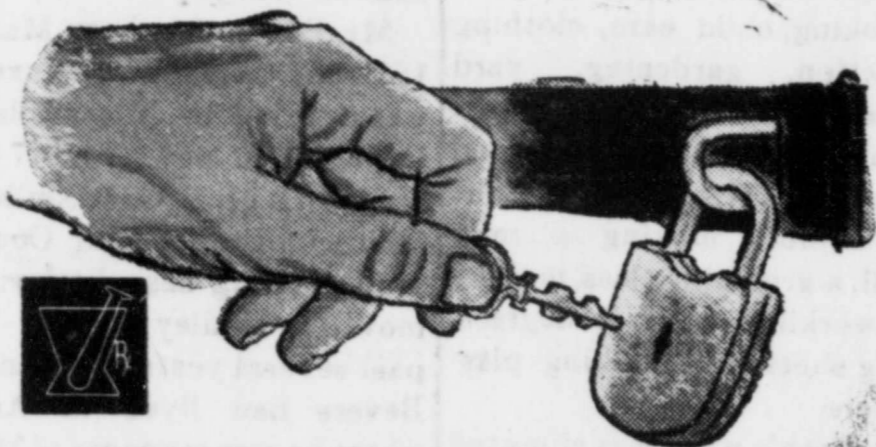
