Hedley School News

Beginning the school year of 1961 62, all graduates will be required to have 18 credits for graduation, which will be 14 required credits and 4 electives The re quired credits include English 4 Math 2, Vocational Ag or Home Ec 2, History 2, Civics 1, Texas History 1, Science 2, and P. E. (2 years) 1.

A student will be allowed to take a total of two courses by correspondence to apply toward his graduation requirements. He must be of Junior or Senior standing before he will be given permission to take correspondence work from the Armed Forces Institute, the University of Texas and Texas Tech Students must pass the pre-requisite for each subject before being allowed to take advanced credit

Seniors will be required to take four solid subjects each of the last two semesters they are in school. Each of these 4 must be taken from the Hedley School System. However, a student may take correspondence courses in addition if they are approved. Seniors will be required to pass at least 3/4 of this work before being eligible to graduate.





This will be the 17th annual presentation of the "only rodeo of its kind in the nation." All of the contestants are Boys Ranchers and it is the biggest Labor Day Celebration of the Golden Spread All indications are that this will be the fastest, most competitive and thrilling rodeo the boys have ever produced.

Riding professional rodeo stock, boys from 8 to 18 will compete for points and prizes in calf, steer, Junior and Senior bull and brone busting competition. Approximately 90 boys will be competing in two divisions and will ride under R. C. A. rules.




