**Farm Facts** 

MARKET SPECIALS

Richard E. Bell of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service reminds us the Russians need a farm labor force 61/2 times bigger than ours-or about 45% of the available Russian labor-to supply a population only 20% greater than ours.

The American farmer is supplying 182 million of us with nearly all of our food and fiber and there's enough left over to export one-sixth of his cropland output.

The U.S.S.R. had 501 million acres of sown cropland in 1960. The United States had 329 million.

Russia's 53,400 collective farms averaged 6,785 sown acres. Their 6,500 state farms averaged 22,485 sown acres. The average collective had 386 households, and state farms had an average of 753 workers.

The United States, by contrast, prefers smaller but family owned, averaging 409 more efficient farm units. This country had over 3.7 ers per farm.







## **Farm Facts**

According to the Economic Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the average American is eating more fruit than he did 50 years ago.

One person ate an average of about 172 pounds of fruit per year during 1910-14. Today the average person eats about 200 pounds of fresh fruit equivalent yearly.

· Today 50% of the fruit we eat is processed, compared to only 13% back in 1910. The increase in use of processed fruit - particularly canned and frozen-has been about fivefold and has more than offset the per capita decrease in fresh fruit consumption since 1910.

Back in 1910 folks were eating a lot of dried fruit. It been declining since 1920.
