Summer Performance Work

Reporters have started measuring cotton, feed grains, soil bank base crops, diverted acreage and etc and you must assist the reporter when he visits the farm so that fields will be accurately measured.

Fields originally planted to cotton that have been flooded out should be designated so credit can be given for this acreage as cotton history if it is needed. As you know, if less than 75% of the cotton allotment is planted the history for future years will be reduced; therefore it is very important that we include all cotton acreage destroyed beyond the producers control. Acreage diverted under a Conservation Reserve or Great Plains contract contributes to cotton history; also cotton acreage released is considered as acreage planted. Most revisits to farms after the original measurements must be paid by the producer. The following rate will apply for

revisits to farms to check disposition of cotton, feed grains, diverted acreage and soil bank base crops: \$4.00 per farm, plus \$2.00 for each plot over one. To have a farm remeasured for error will cost \$10.00 per farm, plus \$4.00 for each plot over one.

Diverted Acreage
Remember that all acreages designated as diverted under the wheat stabilization and feed grain programs must be planted to an eligible cover crop unless you have obtained approval from the county committee to summer fallow the land.

Again we wish to remind you that no crop can be harvested from the diverted acreage and no grazing will be permitted unless it is authorized later this year.

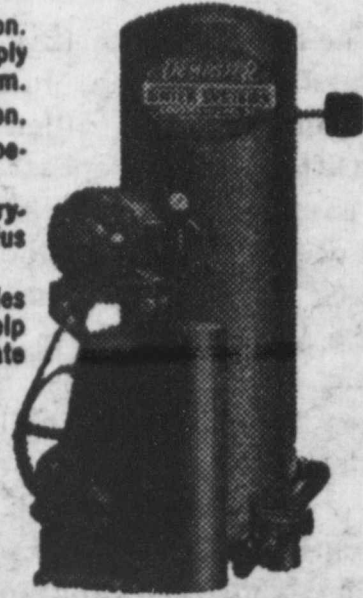

Now is the time for all cotton farmers to begin to watch their young cotton for thrips, fleahoppers and the possibility of boll weevils just beginning to move in from pastures into the young cotton. County agent Flip Breedlove says that regular checking of cotton fields can prevent a great deal of damage by insects before they get started. Cotton spraying guides for all types of insecticides are available at the county agents office. Anyone needing any information on insect control can drop by the agent's office. 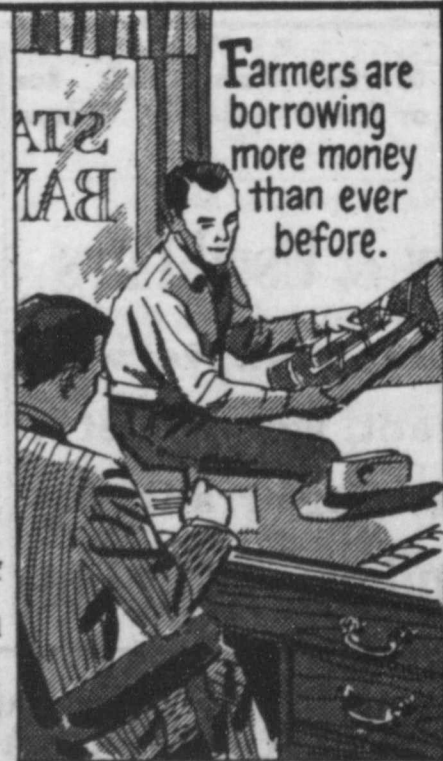
Farm Facts

Farmers are borrowing more money than ever before. In the face of the trend toward larger farms, credit helps provide the things they need to produce more efficiently.

The farmer's use of credit will continue to mount, notes W. D. Curtis, economist with the Louisiana State Agricultural Service. This will be due to: (1) greater investment per farm; (2) an increase in the use of power, fertilizer, chemicals, better seed, and other production necessities; (3) failure of savings to keep pace with mounting capital needs; and (4) a more businesslike approach to credit—if convinced it will pay them to borrow, they borrow.

From 1953 to 1960, the dollar volume of farm credit system loans increased 120%, while the number of farms decreased 30%. Long-term mortgage loans by federal land banks increased 18%, while short- and intermediate-term loans by production

credit associations increased by nearly 26%. Despite the trend to "commercial" farms, the farm family will remain important because it performs the major share of work on these farms.

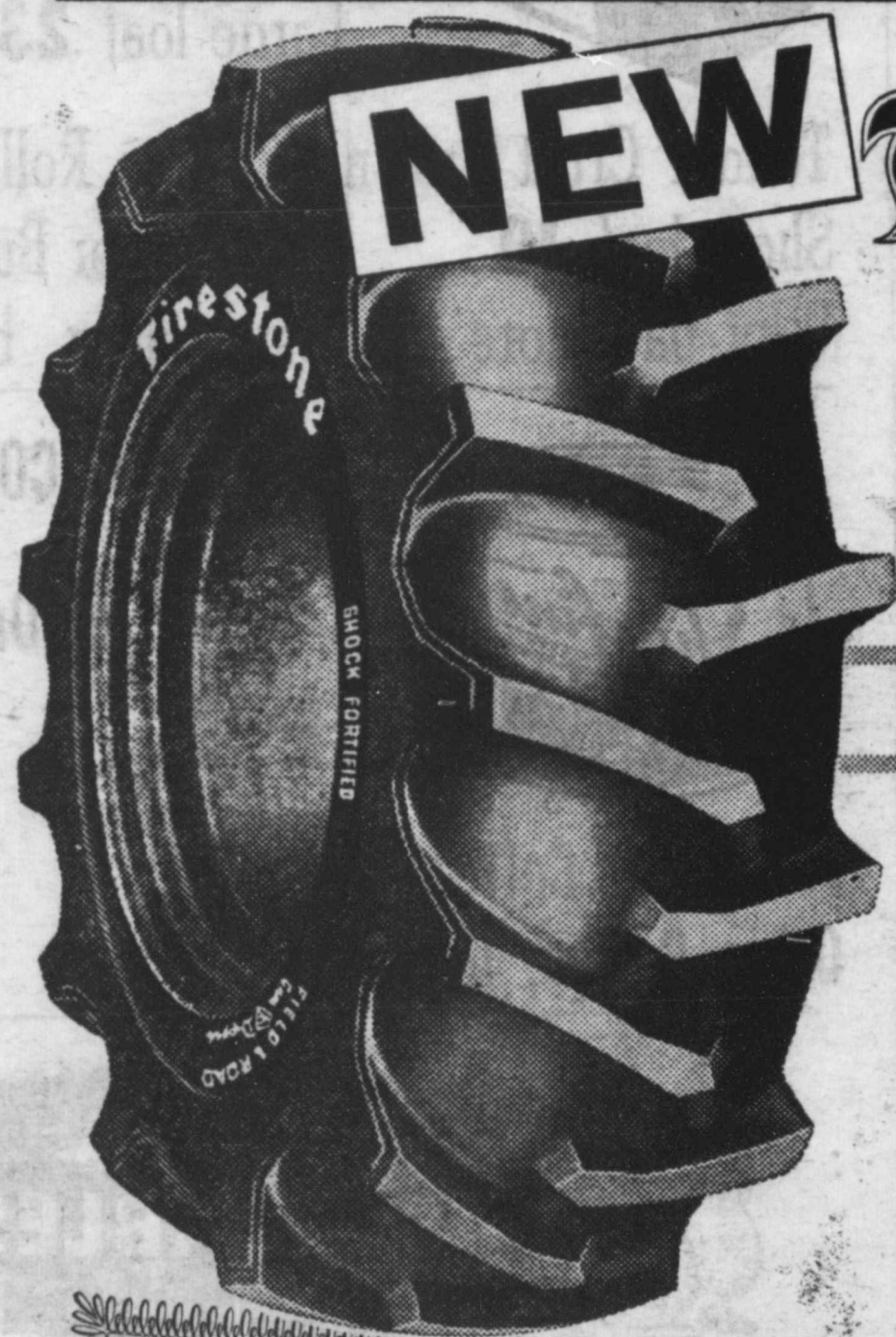

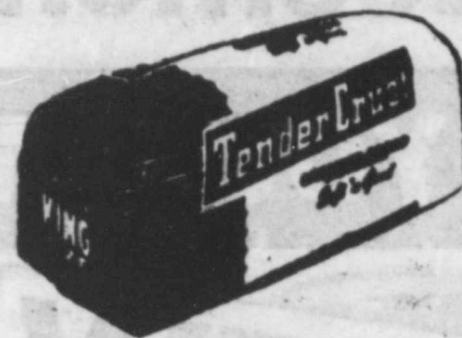
