Plans are underway, according to a newsstory in this week's paper, to get a new track for Bovina Schools.

The idea originated this time through the athletic department and then to the Mustang Booster Club.

A new track we need . . . along with some other things. The school district here has gone through a period of a few years of not thinking progressively enough from a school --- and athletic --- standpoint.

A few years ago, we turned down a couple of bond elections which would have provided for a new football field, fieldhouse and other school improvements.

The elections weren't one-sided, as we remember without looking back at the records, but a majority of the voters just weren't in favor of the improvements. Probably, we didn't do a good enough job of selling the ideas of the leaders of the projects. If we had, the elections probably would have carried.

By making mention of these by-gones, we're not attempting to encourage controversy or re-open old wounds; we're simply saying that we do need more and better athletic facilities. And besides that, we've needed them for the past few years.

In other words, the need is not necessarily a new one. Strangely enough, it seems from here that often the school's best supporters turn out to be its biggest enemies when the word athletics is mentioned.

These folks, and fine people they are, say that we need things to learn with more than we need better things to play with. That's the way they start a conversation about athletic facility improvements.

We have no quarrel with them. We wish our school was the best in the United States . . . academically. And our wishes don't stop there. We wish we could say the same thing for it athletically!

The people who push for higher academic standards have a tendency to do so only when there is an athletic improvement project in the mill. When it's dropped, they worry no more about the academic improvements.

These people, if we read them correctly and we probably don't, want to improve the school system academically . . . at the expense of athletics.

That's not right. The two, academics and athletics, go hand in hand. At least that's what we've been led to believe down through the years. Improve one and the other also benefits.

Abraham Lincoln, the greatest Republican president this country ever had, said something about "you can't help the poor by tearing down the rich."

The same theory holds true, in our opinion, when you consider helping the school academically and not improving it athletically.

As a school district, we have no reason, other than shortsightedness, not to have facilities for all school activities as good as the best.

Take away school districts which have the advantage of oil incomes and we're as well off as any of them and a heap better than most. Compare our area with the other school districts from a natural resources standpoint and we desay you'll find us at the top of the group.

By natural resources, we mean the ability to pay school taxes. And we don't mean to say in this space at this time that we're in favor of additional school taxes.

On the contrary. At the same time, if we admit that our school facilities aren't as good as those of other schools in our area and in our enrollment classification, then we might as well admit that we have other problems.

Nobody asked for our opinion, but it should be worth at least what you paid for it.

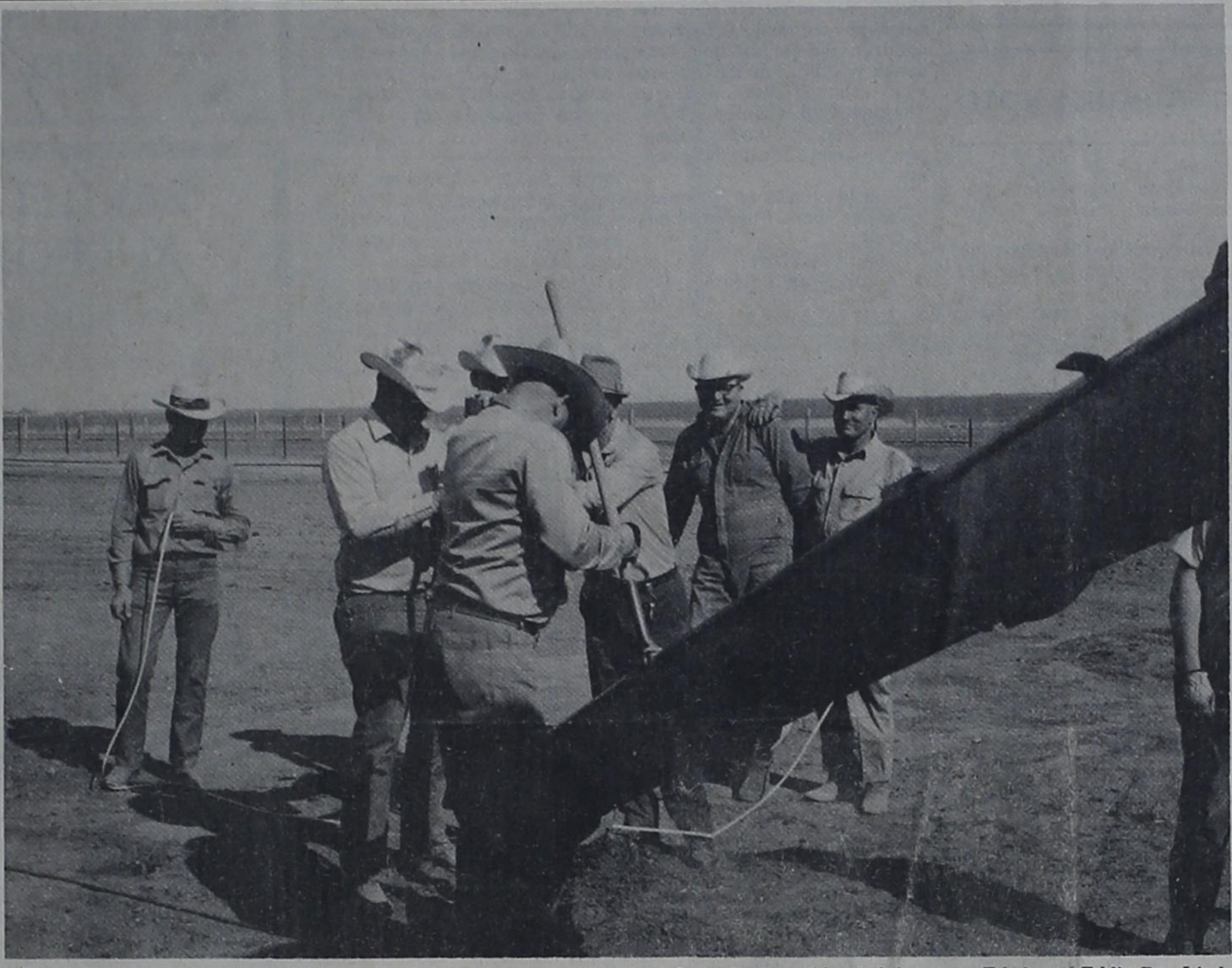
The drought situation is getting bad . . . and that's an understatement. But it's getting so bad now that folks are beginning to see some humor in it.

## Club Considers New Athletic Facilities

### Boosters Re-Organize, Plan Improved Track

Discussion of a new athletic track for Bovina Schools highlighted a meeting of Bovina Mustang Booster Club Tuesday night of last week in the school's cafeteria.

The need for a track was explained by members of the coaching staff including Gib Hough, Dalton Morrison and Roy Donaldson.

The school presently owns land across west Eighth Street from the main school property and north of Ridgelea Elementary School that is now being used for a track and is the proposed site of a new one.

Grady Sorley was elected president of the Booster Club for the forthcoming year. He succeeds Wayne Spears at the post. Named vice president was Bob Fillpot. Mrs. Rose McCain was elected secretary-treasurer.

Members of the student athletic council were introduced early in the meeting. This council, among other things, will issue punishment to athletes guilty of breaking training and other rules next school year, according to an arrangement which will be initiated.

Shannon Davis, chairman of the council, read training rules to those attending the meeting. Sorley appointed a five-member

committee to investigate the possibilities of building a track here. Committee members are A. L. Hartzog, Vernon Willard, Tom Caldwell, Lewis McDaniel and Lawrence Jamerson.

The group is scheduled to have its first committee meeting Monday night at the school.

The group agreed that the club's first financial project should be to pay off the \$1200 indebtedness.

Named to a fund-raising committee were Mrs. Shirley Ware, Mrs. McCain, Houston Bartlett, Jay Sherrill and Fillpot.

A primary project in years past has been to pay the cost

of filming Mustang football games. The organization also provided funds for buying a weight machine for athletes' use and the present indebtedness of the club ties in with that purchase.

Estimates on the cost of the proposed new track were in the \$5000 neighborhood at the meeting.

Plans of the committee in charge of investigating the possibilities of the new track are expected to be announced following the Monday night meeting.

Invited to the meeting were parents of all Bovina Schools students who participate in athletics.

## Weather Offers Quick Change

## Pre-Registration Set At Ridgelea

Pre-registration for next year's first graders and kindergartners will be held at Ridgelea Elementary School beginning at 9 a.m. Thursday, May 1, according to Wilson DiCuffa, elementary principal.

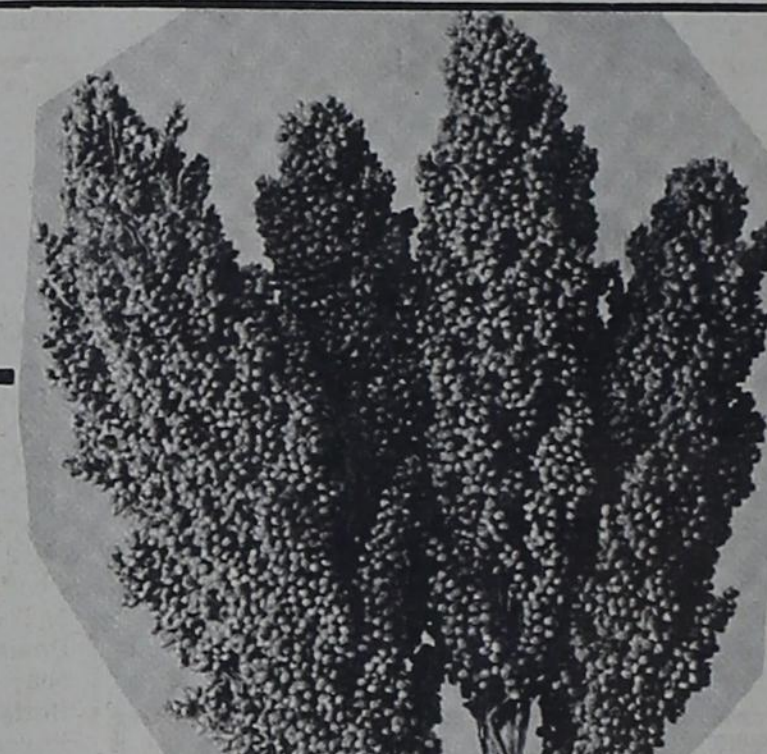

# Name Hub Man Conservation Farmer

Leroy Johnson of the Hub Community as the outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1970. Johnson and his wife, Christine, have three children and are members of the First Baptist Church in Friona.

Part of Johnson's success as a Conservation Farmer can be credited to his background in the hardware business and as an officer of the bank in Shallowater. This last activity has kept him current on money management, allows needed diversion from farming, and allows him to see both sides of the money business. Johnson believes conservation of irrigation water is a must on the High Plains. To conserve his own irrigation water, Johnson utilizes several tailwater pits. He said that one tailwater recovery pit will yield as much as a 400 gallon per minute irrigation well not to mention the fact that the water is much cheaper.

Soil management as well as water and money management is an integral part of Johnson's operation. Soil tests give precise fertilizer requirements and crop residues left on the soil give good soil tilth and wind erosion protection. Johnson, being interested in preserving wildlife, believes the crop residues also provide cover and food for game birds. This concern for natural resources is the mark of an outstanding Conservation Farmer.
