



Farm Facts

World wheat production in 1961 amounted to an esti-mated 7,830 million bushels, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Of this, the United States supplied almost 1,235 million, or more than 15% of the total.

Russia, with production estimated at 1,900 million bushels, accounted for about 24% of the total wheat output. Russia's wheat acreage, however, was an estimated 155 million, as compared with 51.6 million for the United States.

Yield per acre for the Russians amounted to 12.3 bushels, compared with 23.9 bushels for the United States. In per acre yields, however, several countries far outstripped both the United States and Russia.

The 1961 average for Denmark was 61.8 bushels. Wheat India ranked third with 398 yields averaged 58.2 bushels million bushels, followed by per acre in The Netherlands and more than 50 bushels in Canada with 261.7 million. Belgium and the United Figures for Red China, a Kingdom.


Rogers To Speak




