Polling place for F and G Communities will be the West Texas Gin here. Polls will be open from 8 a m to 6 p m.

Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engaged in the production of an upland cotton crop in 1962. Approval by at least two thirds of the voters is necessary if the quotas are to go into effect.

Issues to be decided are to have quotas or not also the level of price support to be available for the 1963 cotton crop.

Farm Facts

When explorers came to the New World they found the Indians using tobacco in much the same way it is used today. Since that time, tobacco production has spread to many countries.

The United States, however, has long been the leader in tobacco production. Total output in 1960 amounted to more than 8.8 billion pounds, with the U.S. accounting for more than 1.9 billion and China for about 1.8 billion.

India, Russia, Brazil, Turkey, and Japan are among other countries growing large tobacco crops.

North Carolina is by far the largest tobacco producing state. The 1961 crop in the Tarheel State totaled almost 844 million pounds, compared with 391.3 million for Kentucky, 153.4 million for Virginia, 151.8 million for South Carolina, and 137.6 million for Georgia.

Tobacco is native of the Americas.

Cigarettes took 1,212 million of the 1,487 million pounds of leaf tobacco used in the U.S. in 1960. Consumption amounted to 484.4 billion cigarettes, or 3,908 per person (15 years of age and over).
