Merchant Marine Appointments Open

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18—Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa announced today that Jan. 31 has been set as the deadline for accepting nominations of candidates for the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy.

Mr. Rogers is entitled by law to nominate 10 qualified applicants from the 28 county area of the 18th Congressional District.

He announced that he will receive applications for nominations up to the Jan. 31 deadline.

The Merchant Marine Academy, one of the five federal academies, trains young men for careers as officers in the nation's Merchant Marine. Its four year college program leads to a BS degree, a U. S. Coast Guard license as a third officer or third assistant engineer in the Merchant Marine, and a commission in the Naval Reserve.

Successful nominees will attend the academy beginning with the school year opening this fall.

Congressman Rogers said prospective applicants seeking more detailed information about the program of the Merchant Marine should contact his office or write to the academy's training representative, Maritime Administration, P. O. Box 52948, New Orleans, La.

NDEA Loans

NDEA loans for summer of 1963, fall and spring terms of 1963-64, and summer term of 1964 are still available.

The 1963-64 school year is the last year for the original Congressional Appropriation of the National Defense Education Act, Student Loan Program.

In order to properly allocate the balance of the appropriated funds, all persons interested in applying for an educational loan in any or all of the four above school seasons, should make an application on or before April 1, 1963. Only by getting all of the applications in early, can they be equitably processed.

Clarendon Junior College has some Spring term of 1962-63 loan funds remaining. Application may be made by students who wish to enroll for the Spring term at Clarendon Junior College. These applications must be in the office of

Water Is Important

These freezing cold days make us realize more than usual the importance of water. Today we make far greater demands on our water supplies than ever before.

In our homes we use water for many purposes, drinking, preparing food, washing our bodies, clothing and household goods, watering our lawns and gardens, and in many other ways. Air conditioners have greatly accelerated the demand for water.

Water turned the wheels of the nation's earliest mills. Today it turns the wheels of mighty hydro electric plants to give lights to our cities and power to our industries. And most of the power not created by moving water is created by water in another form, steam.

Like the ancient Egyptians, we use water to irrigate our land. But we are using far more water than the Egyptians used. Some 135 billion gallons a day are now used for irrigation in the United States.

Water transportation is another important factor in our use of water, which has been tremendously increased by the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Besides these long time water uses we have others, most important of them centered around our industries. Some 150 billion gallons of water are used daily by industry in this country. For instance the ton of steel in the average American automobile requires 285 tons of water in its conversion from iron ore.

Finally, we use water for much of our recreation. It creates beauty in our landscapes, supports fish and wildlife, and provides for fishing, swimming, boating and water skiing. All of these are worthwhile and needed uses of water.

Adult Classes at Clarendon Jr. College

Monday night Jan. 28, 7:00 p. m. has been set for the enrollment of students from the Clarendon Junior College area in the second semester of the adult education on night school program. This announcement was made by Oliver J. Abel, Dean of the College and Director of the night school. The following courses will be offered during the spring semester of the night school program when a sufficient number of students have been enrolled to justify the class. In most cases this number will be set at a minimum of 10 students. With the exception of classes in Bible, Oil Painting, and General Chemistry, the night upon which each of the classes will meet will be determined by the students in each class at the first regular session. Bible 137, (Life and Teachings of Jesus) and Oil Painting will meet on Monday night. General Biology will meet on Tuesday night.

In addition, the following classes will be offered: Beginning Typing, Intermediate Typing, Beginning Shorthand, Intermediate Shorthand, Bookkeeping and Accounting, Arts and Crafts—Creative Hobbies, Government 223 (State), American History 213, General Chemistry, General Physics, Business Math, Business Law, English 113 (Composition and Grammar).

All classes will meet one night weekly. The length of the class session is determined by the semester hour value of the course. For example, three hour courses will meet from 7:00 to 9:40 one night weekly.

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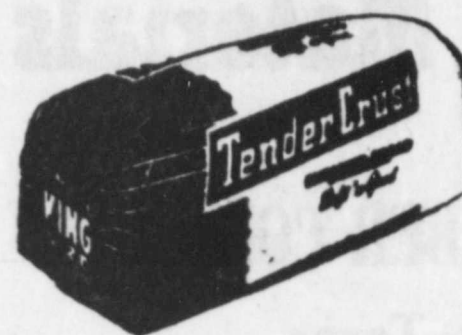
