# **Enrollment at CJC** Hits Record High

The largest number of students to enroll at Clarendon Junior College was completed with the last day of registration Sept. 23 showing a final total enrollment of 190 students. The night school enrolled a total of 47 students and a total of 153 were enrolled in day school Ten of these students were enrolled in day and night classes.

This growth represents a determination of all the individuals who continue to work for a growing college in this area. The increased student contact program that began in February, 1964, is one of the major reasons for this increased enrollment. Preliminary studies indicate that a comparable increase will be obtained by the fall of 1965. CJC is a growing institution.

The purpose of the meeting among other things is to appoint banks to act as depositories for the Authority before the funds from the sale of the \$4,100,000 bonds are received. The money is supposed to be available before Oct. 15th.

The Texas Water Commission Monday granted Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority permission to amend its permit.

The action will allow Greenbelt to move the location of its proposed dam on Salt Fork of Red River nine miles upstream. Also, the dam and reservoir storage capacity will be reduced from 90,000 acre feet at 2481 feet above mean



Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Col Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the time has arrived for Texas motorists to have their vehicles inspected again.

Garrison said Sept. 1 marked the beginning of the 1965 vehicle inspection period as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. As in previous years, the period will end on April 15, 1965.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1965, more than 5,200,000 Texas registered vehicles will have to be inspected at the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas," he said.


