Greenbelt Dam

Last week the Donley County Farm Bureau passed a resolution opposing a requested legislative change in the law creating the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority which would permit the Authority to acquire and develop underground water and water rights.

The Authority published notice of their request in The Hedley Informer on January 1st.

When informed of the opposition to the Greenbelt's request, Dr. S. H. Townsend of Childress, president of the Water Authority, stated, "I feel there is a misunderstanding.

"Directors of the Authority felt that the request was needed should the Authority have to use the water wells of Childress or Quanah or the other towns to supplement the water needs of the cities before the entire Greenbelt project is completed, which is probably over four years away.

"Once the project is completed we feel that it will not be necessary to ever use any wells, but between the time the first Greenbelt water is received on June 1, 1965 and the time the project is completed and the lakes filled with water we do not know what we will need.

"Engineers state that once the project is completed, the Greenbelt will be able to provide two and a third times the water needed by the towns involved in the year 2010. That would indicate we have no plans to develop any underground water.

"We do not have any money to develop wells of any kind and do not expect to ask the Texas Water Development Board or the people in the Authority to vote to give us any additional money.

"It is our intent to ask the legislature to give us the additional authority only to make it legal for us to produce water from the present city wells only which will be turned to us when the Greenbelt delivers water to the cities should that water ever be needed," said Dr. Townsend.

Ship Collision

An American cargo ship and a French coastwise gasoline tanker collided Monday night in the English Channel off Le Havre, France. The tanker Port Manech sank after survivors were removed by the American ship and sent ashore in small boats.

Captain of the American ship, the Lucile Bloomfield, was James W. Webb of Amarillo, formerly of Hedley. He advised his wife and other relatives in Amarillo that all his crew were safe.

Two French, one the wife of a crew member, died of burns. Five other French were missing and 20 injured, eight of them seriously. The American ship also caught fire but the flames were quickly controlled.

The Lucile Bloomfield, a 6,103 ton vessel out of Galveston, was on a voyage from New Orleans to Southampton, England, and other ports.

RFD Patrons Asked To Help Carrier

Postmaster Elva Davis today appealed to postal customers on

rural routes to help their rural carrier make mail delivery during bad winter weather. The Hedley post office has one rural route covering an area extending in every direction from the post office Mrs Davis said at the

same time she hopes all authorities concerned with rural routes will continue to cooperate to help the mailman get through

The Postmaster listed these points of particular concern:

- 1 Approaches to rural boxes must be kept open by customers.
- 2 Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible


Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave Form 4056, "Your mailbox needs attention," a notice to keep approaches clear by removing all obstructions,

including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible

Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out. Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, she explained

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail customers should temporarily relocate their boxes or arrange to receive their mail through other patrons' boxes, or call at the office for the mail until travel on the roads can be resumed.

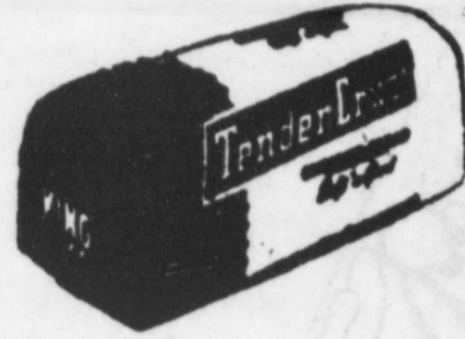
