## Circus To Be Here Wednesday, April 28

The Fairyland circus will appear in Hedley on Wednesday, April 28, at the ball park under the auspices of the Hedley Little League.

The Fairyland circus this year presents its performance in a European style tent, where every seat is a good one and no extra charge for any seat. Adults will be \$1.00 student tickets 75¢ and children 50¢.

The circus is the most ancient and persistently popular form of entertainment devised by man, and today it remains the only form of amusement that has never required a censor. It caters strictly to the family.

The Fairyland circus does not lay any pretentious claims to being the largest circus in the world, but they do maintain that they have spared neither time nor expense to make it the very best possible.

He is survived by his wife; a son, Matthew C. Allen Jr. of Memphis; a daughter, Mrs. Darrell Long of Amarillo; and a brother, Buddy Allen of Terrell.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete at press time.

#### Extension of Grazing and Haying CR Land

The emergency program for grazing and-or haying soil bank acreages has been extended until April 30, 1965. The grazing and haying rates are the same.

Producers will not be permitted to graze CR acreages to such an extent as to destroy the cover.

If you intend to graze or hay your soil bank land be sure to come to the office and sign an application for approval of the County Committee to do so.

#### Substitution for Wheat and Feed Grain

If you plan to substitute either wheat for feed grain or feed grain for wheat, be sure you fully understand the substitution provisions.

If you haven't talked with us about this matter, be sure to do so before May 1



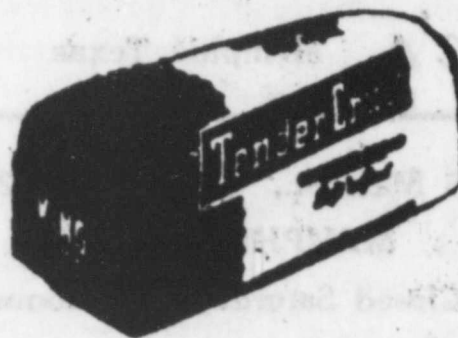
