New Grower Wheat Allotments

July 1, 1965, is the final date set for filing an application for a new grower wheat allotment. To be eligible for such allotment, neither the owner nor the operator of the farm for which the application is filed can have an interest in a wheat allotment anywhere in the United States. Also, the operator must expect to obtain at least 50% of his livelihood from the commodities produced on the farm.

Price Support Loans

The county loan rate for wheat produced in Donley County in 1965 is \$1.25 per bushel subject to premiums and discounts. The service charge is one half cent per bushel.

The grain sorghum loan rate of \$1.63 per cwt. is available to all producers complying with the feed grain program. The service charge for grain sorghum is one cent per cwt.

Measurement Service

The measurement service is available and will be performed upon request of the farm operator

or other producer and payment of the cost of the service. Services will include: (a) Staking and referencing prior to regular compliance determination and prior to adjustment, (b) measurement of crop or land use acreage before regular compliance (c) establishment of official acreages for fields and subdivisions and (d) determination of total cropland.

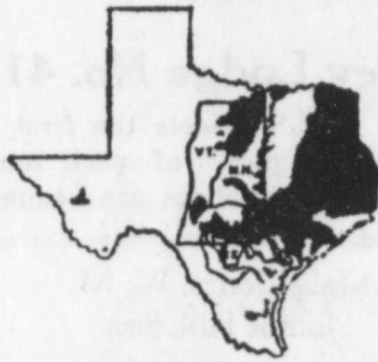

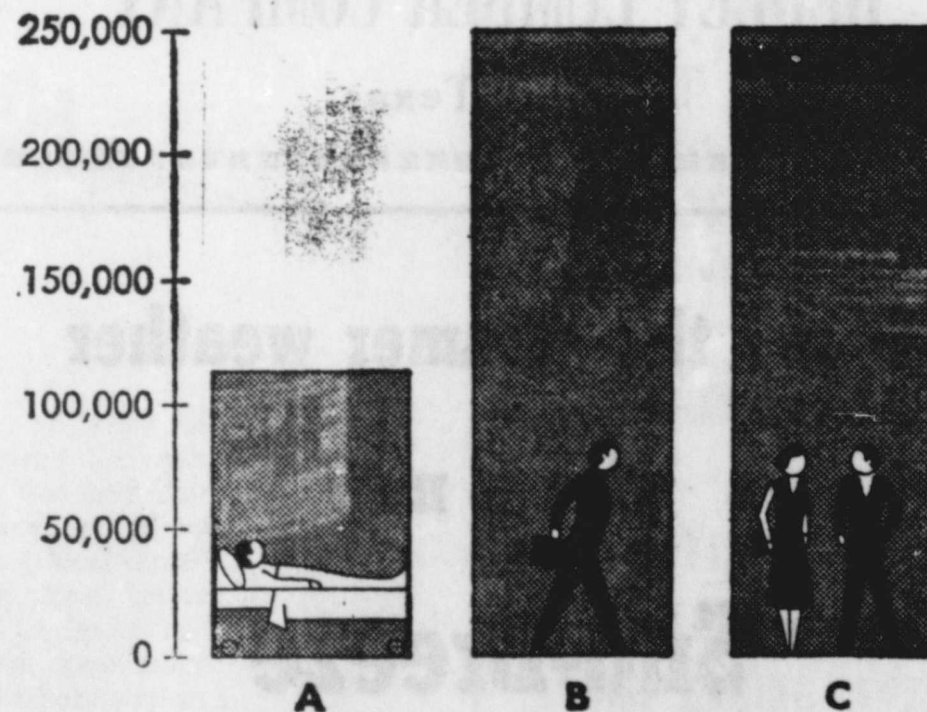

610,000 Americans still have active tuberculosis or are classified as "high risk" individuals.

- A. 110,000 are known to have active tuberculosis.
- B. 250,000 are recently recovered TB patients, many of whom are subject to relapse.
- C. 250,000 are known to have had contact with new active TB cases recently reported.

610,000 persons, all told, are now in the TB picture—either as actively ill patients or in the "high risk" category. Christmas Seal funds help provide the hope and the means of achieving ultimate control and eradication of tuberculosis in the U. S.

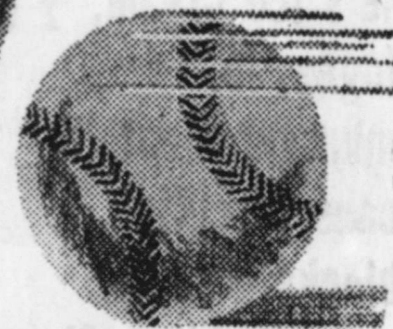
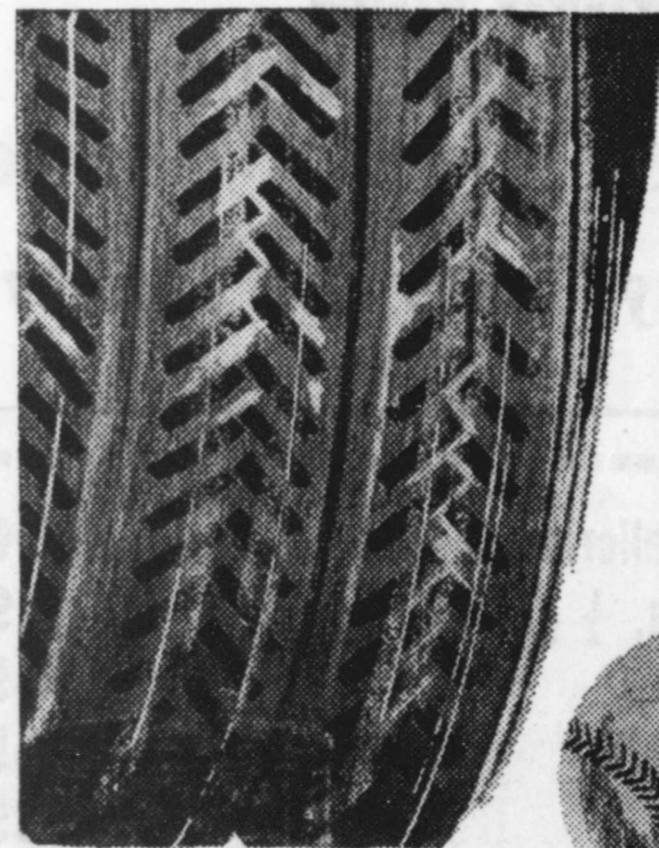

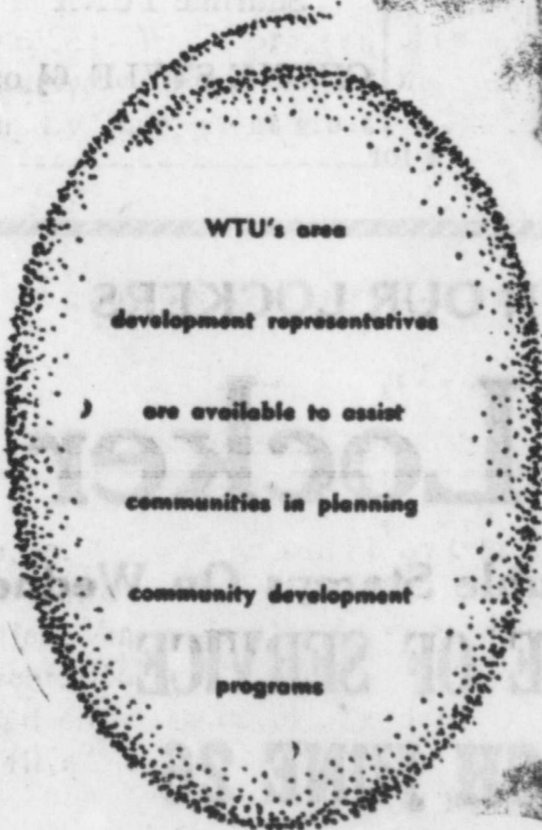
