## SBA Loans

Effective July 1, the Lubbock office of the U. S. Small Business Administration has full authority to approve direct loans of up to \$100,000 and loans in participation with banks of up to \$350,000, according to SBA Regional Director Jack Teddlie.

The regional office also has authority to handle servicing of accounts including extension of terms or other actions necessary, Mr. Teddlie explained.

"This is the result of decentralization of SBA to bring the decision-making closer to the businesses being aided and to speed service," Mr. Teddlie explained. "In addition the agency expects to save \$27 million a year starting in fiscal 1966 by eliminating duplication of paperwork in Washington and the 68 regional offices and from continued improvement in employees work performance."

### A. S. C. News

#### Domestic Cotton Allotment Program

Where an agreement to participate has been filed and the farm does not comply with the provisions of the program any advance payments must be refunded with 6% interest. If the domestic cotton allotment is exceeded the farm will not be eligible for CCC price support loans on any of the 1965 cotton crop. Any farm that exceeds its feed grain base even though it stays within the domestic allotment price support payment but will be eligible for the CCC loan on the cotton. Any farm with an effective allotment of 15 acres or less and is automatically in the Domestic Allotment Program is not required to stay within its feed grain base.

**Farm Facts**

The history of barley is almost as old as that of agriculture. It is believed to have originated in Asia and to have been grown in Egypt nearly 70 centuries ago. The cereal is mentioned in the Bible and mythology and dates back to 3500 B.C. in Mesopotamia, 3000 B.C. in Europe, and 2000 B.C. in China.



Barley is one of the oldest known grains.

Barley has the shortest growing season of any cereal and because of this can be grown in the cool climate of Norway or in hot, dry Morocco.

Although used primarily for livestock feed in the United States, barley is an important item in the human diet in parts of Africa and Asia.

Since antiquity, barley has been used in the brewing of beer, and today nearly all beer is made from it. More than 85 million bushels are consumed in the U.S. annually for alcohol and alcoholic beverages as compared with about 230 million bushels for livestock feed.

The U.S. leads the world in

barley production, followed by France, Canada, the United Kingdom, West Germany, and Turkey. North Dakota, California, Montana, Minnesota, and Washington are our top barley producing states.


