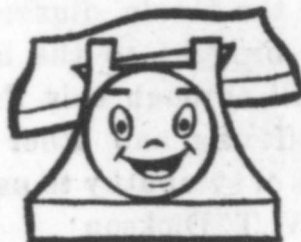

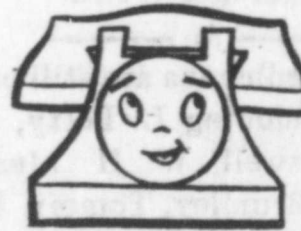

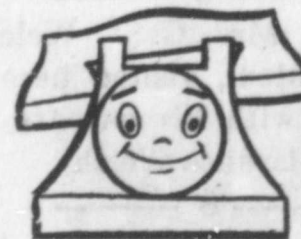

Social Security News

Field Representative Gerald Millard of the Amarillo Social Security office will be at the courthouse in Clarendon on Wednesdays, Oct 6 and 20, Nov. 3 and 17, and Dec 1, 15 and 29, from 8:30 to 11:30. He will also be at the American Legion Hall in Memphis on Tuesdays, Oct 5 and 19, Nov 2, 16 and 30, and Dec. 14 and 28, from 9:45 to 12:30.

He will be available to conduct any business relating to Social Security.

Quail Season

The quail season in the Panhandle area opens Nov. 13 and closes Jan 31. Bag limit is 12 per day with a possession limit of 36.

A hunting license is required of every citizen of Texas who hunts outside the county of his residence or who hunts deer or turkey, except persons under 17 or over 65 years of age or persons hunting on the land on which they reside are not required to purchase this license, but must have an exempt license to hunt deer or turkey.

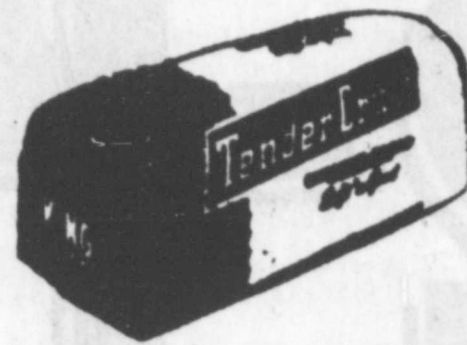
