## FFA News

The radio team of the Hedley FFA chapter placed first in the Greenbelt District Leadership contest held in Childress Saturday, Nov. 20. Members of the team are Richard Shaw, Johnny Hoggatt and Mike Chesser. The topic of their program was "Should a Boy in High School Take Vocational Agriculture?"

The boys prepared the script themselves with little assistance. These boys will enter area competition in a contest in Plainview on Dec 3.

These three boys have an outstanding record in leadership, having won blue ribbons in their division in the district each year. In their freshman year they went on to the state contest in chapter conducting and placed second there. Last year they qualified for area competition in a farm skills demonstration, and this year they have won their radio contest. They have set the best record of leadership work in the Hedley chapter and few boys in the state can equal this record.

## College Election

Kenneth Vaughn, president of Clarendon College, and Weldon Day, dean of the college, were appreciated callers at the Informer office Monday. While here they left a detailed explanation of the election to be held on Thursday, Dec 2, to expand the College district to cover the entire county.

Presently in the College district are Ashtola, Sunnyview, Chamberlain Midway, Martin, Clarendon, Hudgins and Naylor-Fairview. If the election carries, the area to be joined to the present district would be the Donley County part of Lelia Lake, Hedley, Groom, Alanreed, Bairfield and Quail.

If this election carries, a further tax election will be necessary. The proposed rate will be 60¢ per \$100 valuation, and the proposed basis for tax valuation will be set at one third of the cash market value. For example, property having a cash market value of \$6,000 would have a tax valuation of \$2,000, and the annual tax on this amount would be \$12.

Clarendon College has an enrollment for the fall semester of 228, an increase of 35% this year.

Persons eligible to vote in this election will include all who have paid a poll tax that expires Jan. 31 1966, or are exempt, and who reside within the county.

There can be no question that Clarendon College is a valuable asset to this county, but its growth or otherwise is a matter for the voters to decide. Whatever your convictions, vote them on Dec 2.

## Highway 287 Work Approved

The Texas Highway Commission on Nov. 16 approved the expenditure of \$2,095,000 for the construction of grading, structures and surfacing for two additional lanes on U. S. Highway 287 extending from Clarendon southeast to the Hall County line, a distance of 23.6 miles in Donley County. The purchase of right of way on this section of U. S. Highway 287 was approved on a previous program as part of the 1967-68 Consolidated Highway Program, announced District Engineer V. J. McGee of Childress. This work will be under the supervision of L. Clyde Drake, Supervising Resident Engineer, Wellington.

Also included in this approved program was the placing of seal coat on the northbound lanes of U. S. 287 from the Armstrong County line to State Highway 70, in Clarendon, and on U. S. 287 from the east city limits of Clarendon to Hedley. The estimated cost of these seal coat projects in Donley County is \$89,600.

Work authorized for this county is part of a two year \$350 million Consolidated Highway Program, described as one of the most important in the history of the Texas Highway Department.

## Cotton Report

The open weather this week permitted harvesting to become more active, and as a result sample receipts increased at the Memphis classing office according to the USDA Consumer and Marketing Service.

During the week ending Friday, Nov. 19, 5,000 samples were classed as compared with 3,000 last week. For the season, the Memphis classing office has classed 22,000 samples, which is slightly less than a year ago stated K. E. Voelkel, in charge of the local office. In 1961 124,000 samples had been classed as of the same date, Nov. 19.

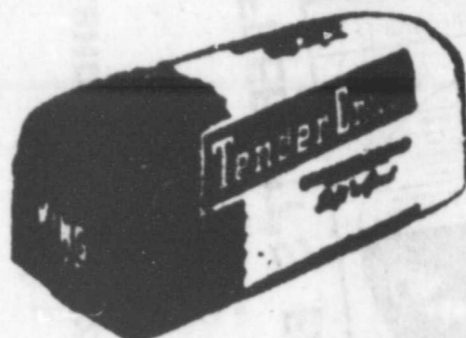
