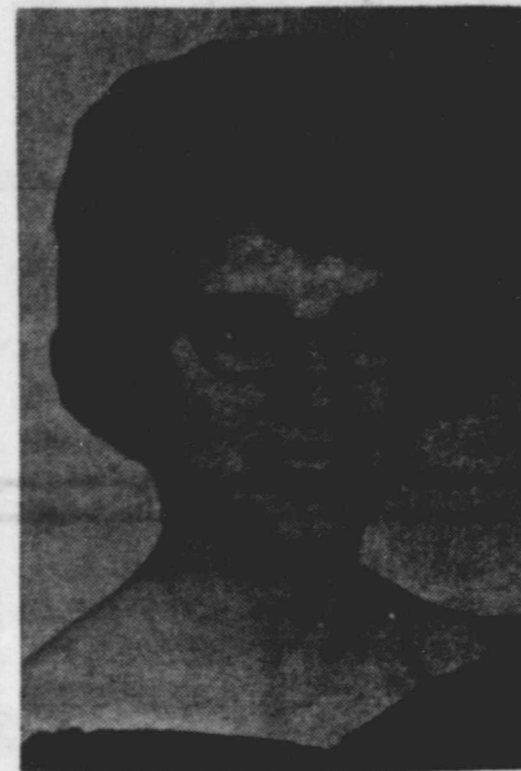

Vehicle Inspection

Austin—Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety has announced that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

He said that the new inspection period began on Sept 1 and will end on April 15, 1967. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

' This means that between now and April 15 1967, each of the five and one half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official vehicle inspection station sign displayed at each station.

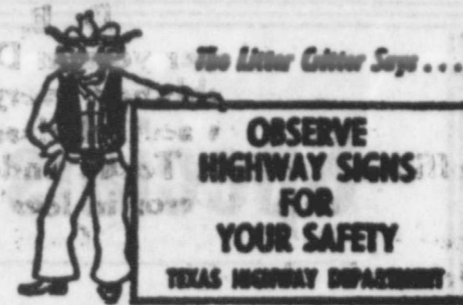
DPS Positions Open

In an effort to ease the manpower shortage in the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, the Department's uniformed services have gone on a five day work week, as of September 1, 1966. Salaries have been raised to \$468.00 and \$484.00, depending on the branch of service.

4-H DAIRY SHOW

THE 4-H girl or boy who holds the ribbon or receives a trophy for a dairy animal at the fair has put in hundreds of hours caring for the animal. They usually start with a calf from the farm herd or a calf they have purchased with money earned from 4-H projects.

A visit to the 4-H division of the fair and a talk with the 4-H'ers will reveal that they have not only worked hard to make the main event, but have learned a lot in the process. Preparing an animal for the show ring, they say, takes a lot of skill, time and patience.

The 4-H dairy project also is the training ground for cattle judges. Club members making

the judging team travel to county and state fairs and to the large regional and national shows as well.

Their achievements do not go unrecognized. This year nearly two thirds of all the counties in the U.S. are expected to name some 6,000 medal winners, says the National 4-H Service Committee. The medals, plus state and national awards will be provided for the 10th straight year by the Oliver Corporation, sponsor of the national 4-H Dairy program.

All winners are chosen by the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises 4-H work.

News From Our County Agent

The elm leaf beetle is doing a lot of damage to elm trees throughout Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. The elm leaf beetle is one of the most destructive pests of the elm tree. This yellowish-green 1/4 inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found skeletonizing the leaves or crawling about on the bark of the trunk of infested elm trees.

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides; sevin, DDT, toxaphene or chlordane. Another application may be necessary for the second generation of the beetle, using this application several days after the first one. The addition of 1/4 teaspoonful of linseed oil per gallon of spray will help the spray stick to the leaves of the tree.

Gooch stressed that caution should be used in the use of these and any other insecticide

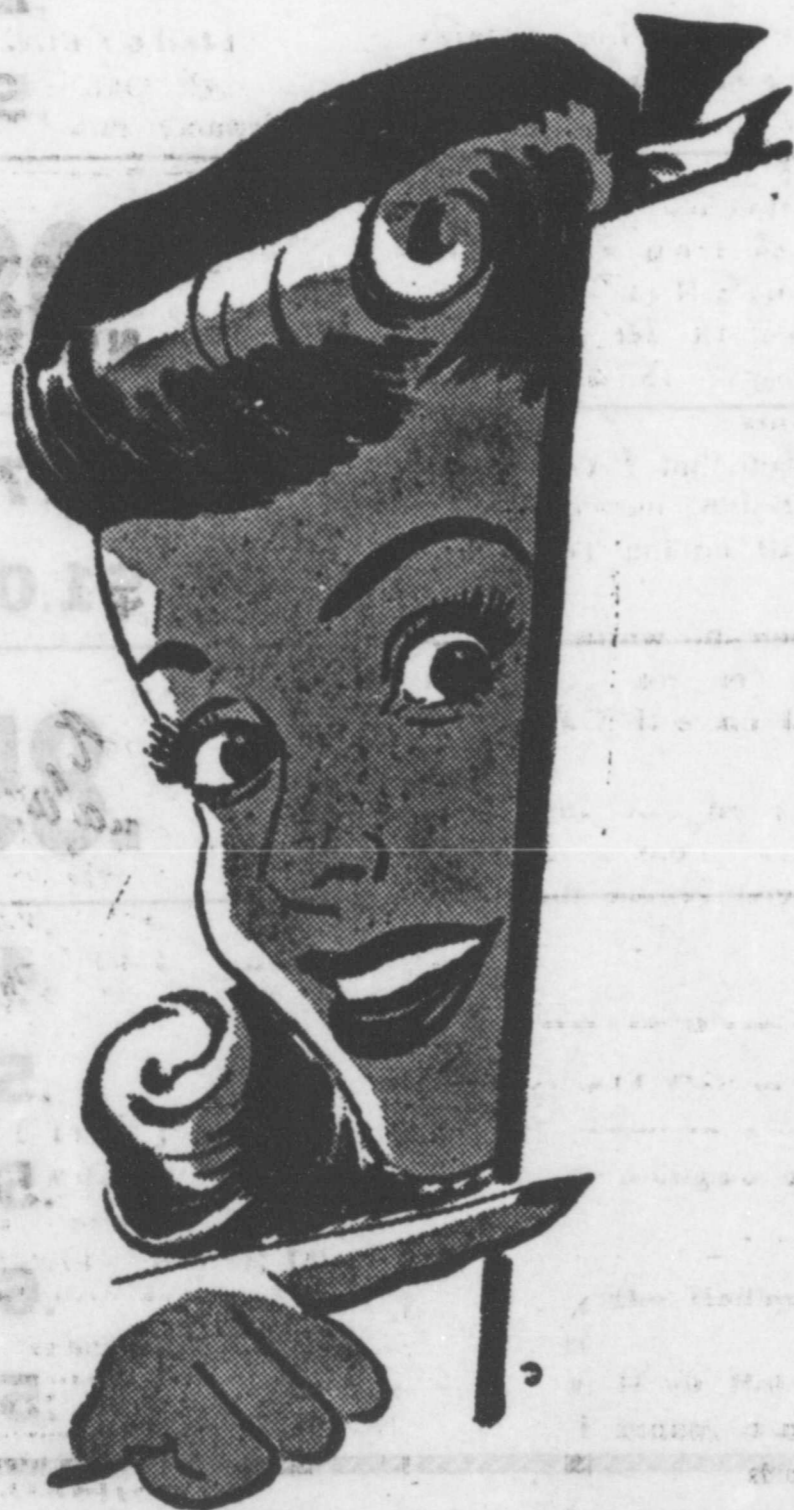
